TRRENT EXHIBITIONS AND OCTOBER OPENINGS:

Current through October 15: Exhibition from the Museum Collection

More than 150 works including special groups: American Painting; British Painting and Sculpture; Italian work; Latin-American art; "Primitives," Portraits, etc. Third floor.

*Current through October 18: Memorial Exhibition of Work by Matthew Nowicki

Photographs and drawings of recent work by this young architect killed in a plane crash last August. First floor.

Current through October 29: Exhibition House, architect: Gregory Ain

House built by California architect in the Museum Garden, sponsored jointly by the Museum and the Woman's Home Companion. Designed for a housing development, this 3-bedroom, 1-story house avoids the usual monotony found in such developments by use of glass exterior walls, sliding inside walls, good modern furniture, etc. Museum Garden, 4 West 54 Street. Admission 50¢. Combination ticket, Museum and Exhibition House, 75¢.

Current through November 5: Recent Acquisitions

A new group of recent acquisitions: work by European and American artists; including Richard Lippold's <u>Variation Number 7</u>: <u>Full Moon</u>; Rico Lebrun's <u>Figure in Rain</u>, and recent paintings by Jimmy Ernst, Richard Pousette-Dart and J.M. Hanson. The important <u>Harlequin</u> painted by Picasso in 1915 is included along with a letter he wrote to Gertrude Stein about the picture. First floor.

Current through November 5: Recent Buildings by Skidmore, Owings & Merrill

Models of Lever House, N.Y.U.-Bellevue Medical Center, the Central Staff Offices for the Ford Motor Co. and Research Laboratories and a Pilot Plant for the H.J. Heinz Co. are shown along with photographs and drawings of other recent work by this firm. First floor.
