CURRENT EXHIBITIONS AND FEBRUARY OPENINGS:

*January 31 through March 18: Swiss Posters

The exhibition will include more than 50 posters, selected from the traveling exhibition of "Pro Helvetia;" a Swiss national poster institution, and from the Museum Collection. It will illustrate the development of the modern poster in Switzerland, in an installation simulating Swiss street display. Auditorium Gallery.

Current through March 25: Abstract Painting and Sculpture in America

A retrospective exhibition including work by American artists of the Armory Show generation, a few examples from the '20s and '30s and a large selection of abstract art of the past decade. To be accompanied by a comprehensive book on the subject by Andrew C. Ritchie, Director of the Museum Department of Painting and Sculpture, who has organized the exhibition. Third floor.
