Dr. Kaufmann, Associate Professor of Philosophy at Princeton University, is the author of several books including Critique of Religion and Philosphy. PORTRAITS FROM THE MUSEUM COLLECTIONS. One hundred paintings, sculptures, drawings, prints, posters and photographs. Among the artists represented are Beckmann, Chagall, Duchamp, Gris, Klee, Kuhn, Matisse, Modigliani, Orozco, Shahn, Sheeler, Vuillard, Wyeth. This selection of portraits offers an unusual and unexpected review of some of the resources of the Museum Collections. Many of the works have been infrequently seen. Several are new acquisitions. Sections of the exhibition will be devoted to self-portraits, portraits of writers, portraits of dealers, portraits from the pages of history, as well as from today's newspapers. Through May 15 CLAUDE MONET: SEASONS AND MOMENTS. An exhibition of Monet's landscapes. Although a large group of Monet's most important early landscapes are included, the exhibition emphasizes those representing a single motif in several versions, at different hours of the day or seasons of the year. It culminates in a selection from the famous "series" - Haystacks, Poplars, Cathedrals, Views of the Thames, Venice, Water Lilies, etc. Between 1891 and 1912 each of these series was exhibited as a related group, although they have not been seen in this way since. Under the direction of William Seitz, a professor of art at Princeton University. Opened March 9. (Third Floor)
