Works by 19 French artists are currently on view at the Museum of Modern Art, New York, in a special exhibition of 20th century portraits selected entirely from the Museum's own collections. Directed by William S. Lieberman, Curator of Prints and Drawings, the exhibition representing various aspects of the Collection, includes photographs, prints drawings, collages, posters as well as sculpture and paintings in a great variety of styles.

Among the works by French artists are the newly acquired painting On the Beach by Christian Berard, "Maria Lani" by Chaim Soutine, the famous double portrait of the artist's mother and sister by Edouard Vuillard, a photograph of Alfred Stieglitz by Henri Cartier-Bresson, drawings and a watercolor of the dancer Vaslaw Nijinsky by huguste Rodin and Marc Chagall, Marie Laurencin's self portrait and three pieces of sculpture by Charles Despiau.

French artists and writers are the subjects of several portraits. The poet Charles Baudelaire is portrayed in a variety of media by Jacques Villon, Andre Masson, Henri Matisse, Georges Rouault and Raymond Duchamp-Villon. Raoul Dufy painted the poet Francois Berthault. Andre Derain, Jean Cocteau and Camille Pissarro are shown in portraits by Balthus, Berard and Robert Andrew Parker.

Alexander Brook was born in Brooklyn in 189°. He is the recipient of many awards including the Second Altman Prize from the National Academy of Design in 1957, and has exhibited in museums throughout the country.

He wrote about the portrait of his artist friend, "The only thing I can think of is my indecision as to whether I wished Biddle to play or not. When he didn't play he was restless; when he played I was. He painted me and then I got back at him."
