NORWICH FREE ACADEMY STUDENTS VISIT MUSEUM OF MODERN ART:

The Senior Honors Class from Norwich Free Academy accompanied by two teachers, Miss Margaret Triplett, Director of the Norwich Art School, and Miss Dorothy Agranovitch, Instructor in History, visited the Museum of Modern Art in New York today (Thursday, May 12) as culmination to the year's art history work in their honors program.

Among the exhibitions they saw were paintings and sculptures from the Museum's Collection, arranged chronologically to give a history of modern European and American art from 1875 to the present, a selection of chairs, china and household objects from the Design Collection, also covering about the same period, and a sampling from the Print and Photography Collections.

The major loan exhibition on view which they visited was "Claude Monet: Seasons and Moments", a large exhibition of Monet's landscapes emphasizing those representing a single motif in several versions, at different hours of the day or seasons of the year.

The group viewed an exhibition of "Portraits from the Museum Collections", one hundred paintings, sculptures, drawings, prints, posters and photographs devoted to self-portraits, portraits of writers, portraits of dealers, portraits from the pages of history, as well as from today's newspapers.

They examined a 13'7" x 6' x 5'2" high model of the additional wing the Museum plans to build at the conclusion of its 30th Anniversary Fund Drive and walked through the Sculpture Garden and saw an outdoor show, three structures by Buckminster Fuller: a radome and two experimental projects.
