The Library of the Museum of Modern Art is benefiting from an art exhibition at M. Knoedler & Co., Inc., New York City, through February 25 of paintings and sculptures from the collection of James Thrall Soby, well-known art scholar and author of 31 books in the field. A selection of these books is being shown along with more than 80 works of art which Mr. Soby, long a trustee of the Museum of Modern Art, has pledged or already given to the Museum Collections.

In his foreward to the exhibition catalog, Mr. Soby says that the purpose of the exhibition is to raise money for the Library and--perhaps more important--to focus public attention on the Library's past achievements, present needs, and hopes for additional resources to make possible imaginative exploration of new methods of documentation and research.

As an example of one need, he points out that although the Museum Library has tripled its holdings since it was established in 1932, it now has less space than when the Museum building on West 53 Street was opened in 1939. The Museum Library has an unrivaled collection of research material in the Museum's special field--the visual arts from roughly 1875 to the present. Its shelves hold over 15,000 books, catalogs and periodicals; its files contain thousands of clippings and documents; its pictorial archives of photographs and slides cover about 100,000 subjects.

Mr. Soby pays special tribute to the "extraordinary efficiency and knowledgeableness of the Library's staff, headed by Bernard Karpel." "The Museum's bibliographies are held in very high esteem throughout the world; the Librarian himself is respected as one of modern art's most perceptive and diligent bibliographers."

Funds for the Library are part of the Museum's current drive for \$25,000,000 for an additional building and for program and endowment funds. The Museum, founded in 1929, receives no federal, state or city subsidy.
