#### WALTER PISTON CONCERT AT MUSEUM OF MODERN ART

A Walter Piston concert, with the composer conducting, will be given at the Museum of Modern Art on Thursday, March 30, at 8:30 p.m. In this third Composers' Showcase concert of the season, Mr. Piston will conduct the New York Chamber Soloists in his "Divertimento for Nine Instruments" (1946); the Curtis String Quartet will play the "gtring Quartet No. 4" (1951); and Lillian Fuchs, viola, and Luigi Silva, cello, will perform the "Duo for Viola and Cello" (1949). Also on the program, the first all-piston concert held in New York, are the "Sonata for Flute and Piano" (1930) and "Three Pieces for Flute, Clarinet and Bassoon" (1926). Composers' Showcase is directed by Charles Schwartz.

Mr. Piston will discuss his work following the performance.

Tickets for the concert, \$3, may be purchased at the Museum, 11 West 53 Street, or by mail. Museum members receive a 25 per cent discount on one or two. Tickets include admission to galleries, open every Thursday until 10 p.m. Dinner and refreshments are available.

One of the leading composers of our time, Mr. Piston has written seven symphonies and chamber music for various instrumental combinations. His work is known for its elegance, style, and craftsmanship. Born in Rockland, Maine (1894), he was a student of Nadia Boulanger in the early 1920's, has in turn taught such younger musicians as Elliot Carter and Leonard Bernstein. Ne was a professor of music at Harvard from 1926 until his retirement last August.

"I believe in making my music as clear as possible," says Mr. Piston. "I believe in music which has something to say. Principles of form and design are as important today as ever. I am interested in content, not so much in the outer clothing. Music must communicate - but, of course, the listener has half the responsibility. I deny being a classicist. I am contemporary. But I'm not avant-garde."

Composers' Showcase and its counterpart, Jazz Profiles, will continue to present Thursday eveing concerts at the Museum. Together, the two non-profit organizations are the only regular concert series entirely devoted to contemporary music and modern jazz.
