#### CURRENT SPECIAL EXHIBITIONS

March 22

PAINTINGS FROM THE MUSEUM OF MODERN ART - National Gallery, Washington D. C. An exhibition of 153 paintings selected by Alfred H. Barr, Jr., Director of Collections, from some 1,400 in the Collection of The Museum of Modern Art. The first survey of 20th century art shown at the National Gallery, the exhibition includes many of the Museum's most notable pictures, such as van Gogh's Starry Night and Rousseau's Sleeping Gypsy as well as more recent work from this country and abroad. Opened Dec. 17.

(Other loans have been made to the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; The Museum of Fine Arts, Houston; The Museum of Art, Carnegie Institute, Pittsburg; the Art Institute of Chicago; Cleveland Museum of Art; the Art Gallery of Toronto; and the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts.)

THE EIGHT. A special New York preview of "The Eight," one of the Museum of Modern Art's circulating loan exhibitions will take place during the week of February 4-10 at the Museum's Guest House, 242 East 52nd Street. The exhibition, selected by Alicia Legg, Assistant Curator of the Department of Painting and Sculpture Exhibitions of The Museum of Modern Art, will be open only to the Museum's 3,000 Contributing Members as a special privilege while the Museum's galleries are closed.
