APRIL OPENINGS

April 5Jackson Pollock. The largest retrospective exhibition of paintings and drawings by the American painter who died in 1956 at the age of fortyfour. Includes loans from Europe, the United States and Japan. A publication will be issued in conjunction with the show. Selected by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings & Prints, and installed by Wilder Green, Program Co-ordinator. The exhibition will also be shown at the Los Angeles County Museum from July 19-September 3. 1st floor, galleries 3 & 4.

April 8-30 (Gal.19) LATIN-AMERICAN ART, 1931-1966. SELECTED FROM THE MUSEUM COLLECTION. A two-gallery show of paintings, sculptures and constructions, including many new acquisitions not shown before. Planned to coincide with Pan-American Week in New York, April 9-16. Gallery 19 on the second floor contains paintings by Orozco, Siqueiros, Tamayo, Portinari, Berdecio, Cundo Bermudez and others, done between 1931 and 1950.

April 9-June 4 (Gal.20)

In Gallery 20 are works in many media by younger artists from Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, Cuba, Guatemala, Peru, Uruguay and Venezuela. In addition, Rivera's fresco, Agrarian Leader Zapata, is installed on the second floor landing together with works by Maria, the Brazilian sculptor, and Fernando Botero, the Colombian painter.
