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WORK OF BRITISH ANIMATION STUDIO SEEN AT MOMA

1980 marks the 40th anniversary of the Halas & Batchelor Animation Studio, the British institution which pioneered the feature-length animated film in Britain with their adaptation of George Orwell's "Animal Farm" and introduced such innovations as 3-D to European animation.
