Wednesday, February 25, 8 p.m. An Evening with Pierre Boulez: Klee's Influence on a Musician

Mr. Boulez is currently director of the Institut de Recherche et de la Coordination Acoustique/Musique, a major musical research center housed in the Georges Pompidou Center, Paris. Considered one of the world's leading post-war composers, he has served as music director of the New York Philharmonic (1971-77), chief conductor of the BBC Symphony Orchestra (1971-75), and principal guest conductor of the Cleveland Orchestra (1969-72).
