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PUBLICATION TO ACCOMPANY CARL TH. DREYER EXHIBITION

A richly illustrated catalogue accompanies the first complete American retrospective of the works of Danish filmmaker CARL TH. DREYER at The Museum of Modern Art. The volume includes film stills and essays and explores the intensity of Dreyer's best known works, <u>The Passion of Joan</u> <u>of Arc</u> (1927-28), <u>Ordet</u> (1954-55), <u>Day of Wrath</u> (1943), and <u>Gertrud</u> (1964), as well as the compassion and humor that illuminate his total oeuvre. One of the undisputed master filmmakers of cinematic history, Carl Theodor Dreyer completed fourteen feature films during his lifetime.

<u>Carl Th. Dreyer</u> features four essays, each presenting a different perspective from which a general audience can appreciate Dreyer's films. Ib Monty, director, Danish Film Museum, traces the filmmaker's chronological development; Jytte Jensen, curatorial assistant, Department of Film, The Museum of Modern Art, examines the evolution of Dreyer's attitude toward his heroines; James Schamus, screenwriter and Dreyer scholar, evaluates Dreyer within the tradition of realist filmmaking and describes his concern for authentic texts; and Carren O. Kaston, arts consultant and film historian, offers an insightful metaphysical interpretation of Dreyer's work.

Published by The Museum of Modern Art and edited by Jytte Jensen, <u>Carl Th. Dreyer</u> is ninety-six pages with seventy black-and-white illustrations. It includes an illustrated filmography and the authorized English-language translation of the script for Dreyer's final, uncompleted

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project, <u>Medea</u>. The paperbound volume is available for \$9.95 in the Museum Store.
