- THE ARTIST Constructivist artist Liubov Popova (1889-1924) is recognized, along with Kasimir Malevich, Alexander Rodchenko, and Vladimir Tatlin, as one of the most important and original artists of the Russian avant-garde. Although she is also one of the most vital and talented women artists of this century, her work is not well known. Popova's career, cut short by her death at age thirty-five, spans the years of the First World War, the Russian Revolution, and the immediate post-revolutionary period.
- CONTENT This first United States retrospective of Popova's work comprises approximately fifty-five paintings and sixty works on paper, as well as a selection of theater, book, and textile designs, many from Soviet collections. Illustrating the artist's stylistic developments from figuration to abstraction to utilitarian design, the exhibition also manifests the sources of her art in Cubism and Futurism, as well as Russian traditions.
- PUBLICATION Liubov Popova by Magdalena Dabrowski. Essay on working methods and materials by Eugena Ordonez, Associate Conservator, The Museum of Modern Art, and an essay on Popova at the Tretyakov Gallery by Irina Pronina, Senior Research Curator, State Tretyakov Gallery, Moscow. 136 pages. 92 color and 38 black-and-white illustrations.
