The book describes and analyzes the works on paper by the controversial and highly influential German artist Joseph Beuys, who is widely acknowledged as the preeminent figure of postwar German art. It attempts to break through the mass of obscure writing about Beuys and introduce this legendary albeit misunderstood artist to a wider audience.

Beuys's drawings are used in the book as a springboard for discussions of his life, art, and ideas. His work is viewed in the broader context of postwar European art, and his drawings are considered chronologically as his formative medium, in relation to his entire oeuvre, and as autobiographical narrative.

Thinking is Form: The Drawings of Joseph Beuys, published by the
Philadelphia Museum of Art, contains 272 pages with 180 black-and-white and
135 color illustrations. The hardbound version, distributed in the United

States and Europe by Thames & Hudson, is available for \$50.00; the paperbound version is available for \$30.00; and both are available in The MoMA Book Store.
