SPECIAL PROGRAMS ACCOMPANY THINKING IS FORM: THE DRAWINGS OF JOSEPH BEUYS

In conjunction with the exhibition THINKING IS FORM: THE DRAWINGS OF JOSEPH BEUYS (February 21 - May 4, 1993), The Museum of Modern Art is presenting a four-part course on consecutive Tuesday evenings in March, two afternoon lunch lectures in April, an installation with accompanying educational materials, and a video program. The schedule is as follows:

Course

<u>March 9, 16, 23, & 30, 6:15 - 8:15 p.m.</u> Joseph Beuys and Postwar Germany

This course, led by Museum lecturers Judy Meigham and Jill Snyder, presents an overview of Beuys's art and social theories. The fee is \$90; \$75 for members. Preregistration is suggested. Enter through the Edward John Noble Education Center, 18 West 54 Street.

Brown Bag Lunch Lectures <u>April 13 & 15, 12:30 - 1:15 p.m.</u> Joseph Beuys: Artist, Activist, Shaman

Weekday slide talks, led by Museum lecturer Susan Cooke, offer an opportunity for adult audiences to bring their lunches and enjoy a presentation on the artist in an informal setting. Admission is \$5 per person. Enter through the Edward John Noble Education Center, 18 West 54 Street.

Installation and video

A display in the Education Center is a tribute to Joseph Beuys's Direct Democracy, a site-specific installation operated by Beuys and his colleagues throughout 100 days of Documenta V, Kassel (1972). A video program of films, which document significant works from Beuys's career, is shown continuously throughout the exhibition in the Education Center.
