The Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Sculpture Garden Garden opens at 6:00 p.m. Concerts begin at 8:30 p.m.

SUMMERGARDEN, a series of free concerts in The Museum of Modern Art's Abby

Aldrich Rockefeller Sculpture Garden, continues on Friday, July 19 and Saturday, July 20 with a

program for violin, cello, and piano. With the exception of Maurice Ravel's *Trio in A minor*, each

work was composed in the last four years and receives its American premiere.

Rondes nocturnes, a major work by the French composer Patrick Burgan, was completed in 1992. Solo III for violin is by Costin Miereanu, a Romanian-born composer who has created a wide variety of works for numerous instrumental and vocal combinations. The third premiere is the 1992 version of Duo for Violin and Cello, Op. 25 by Nicolas Bacri, a composer whose music was deeply influenced by his encounters in Rome with the distinguished Italian composer Giacinto Scelsi. The artists are Brian Krinke, violin, Alexis Gerlach, cello, and Jennifer Undercofler, piano.

On Friday, July 26 and Saturday, July 27, the fourth program of SUMMERGARDEN opens with song cycles by Claude Debussy, Gabriel Fauré, and Francis Poulenc followed by the American premiere of Gilbert Amy's *Oeil de fumée*. Written while he was a teenager and long

regarded by Amy as juvenalia, the songs, with text by Louis Parrot, were just published last year. The evening closes with works by Ned Rorem and Virgil Thomson, American composers closely associated with Paris, and "Songs of the Cabaret and Elsewhere," an eclectic repertory of works by a variety of composers including Jacques Brel, Cole Porter, and Erik Satie.
