The Museum of Modern Art announces as of special interest at this time a gift from Alfred Flechtheim of Berlin of a bronze statue of Max Schmeling, the German boxer, whose bout with Charney will take place Friday evening.

The statue, which is three-quarters length, slightly under life size, is by Rudolf Belling and shows the boxer in his characteristic crouching, pugilistic pose. It is a very interesting example of the athletic type of sculpture and makes a valuable addition to the Modern Museum's permanent collection. It will be on display at the Museum during the summer months.

The exhibition of Homer, Nyder, and Bakins closed June 4th. Approximately 12,000 people saw the exhibition, a truly remarkable number considering the fact that it was held during the late spring. As has been explained before, the lateness of the exhibition was due to the necessity of awaiting the closing of an exhibition of Bakins at the Pennsylvania Museum, from which many pictures were generously loaned to the Museum of Modern Art.

It has been felt advisable to keep the Museum open during the summer months and for the present the hours will remain unchanged. The gallery will be closed from June 5th to the 15th and on the 15th will open its summer exhibition. This exhibition will be in the nature of a retrospective show and will hang during the summer months, being of especial interest to students and visitors in the City at that time, who were unable to see the winter's exhibitions. Many new canvases will be shown as well as the permanent collection of the Museum. Among the artists whose works will be on display are: Bissie, Braque, Burchfield, Cezanne, Chagall, Charlot, Chirico, Deaath, Fernin, Dickason, Dufy, Bakins, Fautrier, Fernin, Gauguin, Grouaife, Hart, Hirsch, Homer, Hopper, Marfiel, Klee, Kahn, Kniyoshi, Lapicue, Laurensain, Leger, Lohbruck, Lurost, Maillet, Marin, Marsh, Matiss, Miller, Niro, O'Keeffe, Pasoin, Phillips, Picasso, Ponsault, Nyder, Segonzac, Seurat, Sloan, Speicher, Sterns, Tchelitchev, Utrillo, vanGogh, and Weber.
