Laughing Anne. USA/Great Britain. 1953. Directed by Herbert Wilcox. In this darkly perverse melodrama, a woman's hopes for love and redemption are dashed when a terrifying figure from her past reappears a former prizefighter who has replaced his amputated hands with iron weights. 90 min.
