



With regard to your memo requesting additions to the suggested periodicals that might be offered to our members at reduced rates, I have some comments.

i appreciate the courtesy of your reply even though it arrives at some conclusions not based upon fact.

if mrs. rich and i were not seriously interested in modern art, we would not be seriously interested in the museum and i can assure you that our interest stems from many years of devotion to the visual arts. i was born in highland park, illinois and began what became almost a weekly pilgrimage to the art institute of chicago well before my teens and continued until the war after which business took me to new york. i need not point out to you that this was a fertile environment in which to develop a serious interest in impressionist and post-impressionist art and covered a long period before chester dale removed his collection elsewhere. while our personal interest insofar as ownership is concerned centers on the impressionist period, we have owned, for many years, some of the nonobjective and other works of edmund cassarella who is represented in your collection too. we find the non-objective and abstract paintings of a few artists most important, but there are too many who have received great notoriety through commercial promotion that are, for the most part, only competent draftsmen.

we appreciate your wishing to know about olivier foss, and i enclose some literature which i will appreciate your returning at your convenience. While they cover his early, formative years, they will serve to acquaint you with his work. he is an american expatrictly living and working in paris since the war and is, as a matter of interest, a brother of lukas foss. some years ago we spoke with augie heckscher, who is most impressed with our foss paintings, about the possibility of giving one of his works to the museum, to be chosen by you, as an example of this contemporary american artist but augie told us that you were interested in contemporary abstract and non-objective art only and he was quite certain you would not be interested. this was corroborated by harry brooks.

i am well aware of the basic function of the museum and the overwhelming problem that confronts you in selecting true art from the hass of

highly publicised junk that floods the market today. true, it reflects a trend in the field of visual expression, but i question that most of it is truly art and a good draftsman is not an artist. the field of commercial art has many good draftsmen. while spatial arrangement of bumpers can be an exciting study in design, it is hardly art. i am devoted to klee, i respect mondrian, but i decry pollock whose high powered promotion by the commercial art establishment is a perfect example of what i am trying to say. ofcourse pollock must be given credit for establishing a method and he is quite skilled in design. when you can find, encourage, and bring to the public's attention artists of the calibre of john marin, you will be fulfilling your obligation to the museum. you will not find it solely in the direction of the collection referred to in my original letter. and wandering only through the lab rinth of such products can be only futile and wasted effort. certainly after so many years of being absorbed in this field almost to the exclusion of others, you should be aware of this by now. it is my considered opinion that the museum's exploratory effort is not catholic in its coverage. while realists are not my cup of tea, they are still contemporary and "modern".

Dear Mr. Loranger:

Alfred Barr has shown me the brief of the Canada Council on Taxation and the Arts and the draft petition which you sent to him, I believe, in May. I understand that you have asked for his comments on the Canadian Government's proposal to levy a 50% capital gains tax on the sale of works of art, although this is not explicitly discussed in either document, and he, in turn, has asked for mine.

Obviously it is true that any capital gains tax tends to discourage the sale of works of art, but whether this is adverse to the over-all national interest would depend at least in part upon the interrelationship of such a tax with such factors as estate and gift taxes and the tax-deductibility of gifts of works of art to tax-exempt public and quasi-public institutions. A perusal of the Canada Council's admirable brief does not provide answers to all these questions, and without them it would be hard to form a definite opinion as to the probable effect of the 50% capital gains tax.

If you should chance to be in New York I would be very pleased to discuss this with you from the standpoint of United States tax law though I rather doubt that I could add anything to that which Canadian lawyers, art dealers and museum representatives have already contributed.

It was good to hear of you again, and I want to thank you, albeit belatedly, for the very kind note you sent me about a year ago. Please let me know if you think I can be helpful to your present project.

Dear Dick:

I'm terribly sorry not to be able to lunch with you, Dixie and Andrew Ritchie tomorrow. We have just moved into a rented house for the summer, our cook has not yet arrived, and we are in a frantic state of confusion.

I especially wanted to talk to you about your letter of May 15th. Coming from someone with your deep interest in the contemporary arts, the letter naturally disturbed us greatly. I don't at all agree with the letter's contents, of course, and I hope that one day soon we can argue the matter at length. At the same time I think it only fair to admit that for a considerable period of time I shared your doubts as to the validity and worth of some of the artists included in the current American show at the Museum. But the longer I've looked the more impressed I've become. Today I'm convinced that the so-called "New York School," many of its members shown in the present exhibition, is more interesting and stronger than the postwar schools in France, Italy, England and Germany.

All that is a question of opinion naturally, but what troubles me is that you should feel we should not exhibit these works because you are out of sympathy with the trend they represent. I realize from your letter that you do not object to abstract art as such. Yet I can't help feeling that the domination of this kind of art today has something to do with your feelings. And here we come upon a basic point of Museum policy which is still not at all well understood. We feel that it is our job to show the public the leading tendencies in contemporary art, not to try to tell artists what these tendencies should be. If you will look back through the Museum's c-talogues of exhibitions, you will find that we have shown all sorts and kinds of painting and sculpture - realist, romantic, surrealist, neo-baroque, "social" realism, etc., etc. Today, with abstraction in its various f rms again ascendant, we have naturally tried to show much of it. An institution such as ours, we feel, should not try to be censor, reformer or polemic agent, but primarily a barometer to record for the public the prevailing currents, using the best qualitative judgement we can summon.

Anyway, it would be a pleasure to do battle with you on some or all of these points, preferably over some of Dixie's best Irish whiskey. Let's have a try at it, at your convenience any time after the middle of this month.

Dear Emily:

Thanks for your memo of March 10th. Ies, please let's sign Ira Haupt up quickly. I told Mrs. Navas of the AFA that we were asking him this year when she proposed him herself. It is such better for us to have first chance at a really distinguished small collection.

The Haupts are not a simple problem. He is an extremely successful youngish lawyer with an ambitious wife whose chief interest seems to be in gardens and garden clubs. She has spoken twice of her interest in joining with Mrs. Lasker in furnishing flowers for the Museum garden. I think that they might give generously to the Museum for this purpose in exchange perhaps for her being elected to some sort of garden committee. I don't know whether he would give without some such overture.

I have been there twice and brought Andrew Ritchie once. I think that he would be pleased to open his collection to the members, at least the first time.

As to the letter which you have drafted, I am afraid the figure 400 is likely to alarm him and all other victims. Can't you let me know about how many you really expect to show up? It seems to me it wasn't more than 20 or 30 in the course of an afternoon but I may be wrong.

I also think that in these letters we might mention some of the more distinguished collections already seen by the members, perhaps Philip L. Goodwin, David M. Levy, Stephen C. Clark, Albert Lasker and John D. Rockefeller, III.

As for other collections, I think we could add Mr. and Mrs. Alex L. Hillman, 895 Park Avanue (French pictures but with a good deal of distinction); Mr. and Mrs. David M. Bolinger, 33 East 70 Street (mostly American pictures but mixed in with French — a really valuable antidote to the overwhelmingly French composition of most of the collections we open to the members); Mr. and Mrs. William B. Jaffe, 555 Park Avanue (another small but really interesting collection of mostly French paintings. He recently gave us a Monet and is a friend of Haupt's. Better ask both of them this year, leaving Hillman out if you want to).

Certain individuals have been given or elected to Life and Honorary
Life Membership and to the Corporation in recognition of their generosity or
in appreciation of their services. Their privileges are that of a Participating
Member unless they contribute \$50 or over annually in which case they receive
all privileges. At the March 8, 1951 meeting of the Board of Trustees, it
was voted unanimously to institute a policy of electing denors of \$5,000 in
cash and/or kind as Life Members of the Museum with all the rights and privileges
of Participating Nembers, such a policy to be effective retronctively.

PROBLEM

Upon review, this resolution has proved impractical.

The Department of Membership still feels, however, that some recognition ought to be given to the people who have donated valuable paintings, sculpture or other works of art to the Meseum's Collection, and to those who have given substantial sums of money for "special projects". This recognition ought to be given in such a way that it will not interfere with the Department of Membership's policy of annual solicitation, nor should it involve such a large number of people as to make the implementation impracticable. At the same ime, it should be flexible enough to cover all possible contingencies.

In view of the conflicting resolutions and decisions of past meetings, the Department of Membership would like to suggest clarifying the whole picture of Life, Monorary Life and Corporation memberships with a new policy as outlined below.

SUCCESTED POLICY

1. Life and Monorary Life Memberships

- A. That no new life or Honorary Life Hembers be elected.
- B. That Life and Honorary Life Members continue to receive the same privileges as outlined above.

Reasons:

The term Life Tembership has a finality about it which makes it difficult to ask for further money. Therefore a future source of revenue is cut off by electing Life Hambers.

It is confusing to have one category of membership which is not based on the present policy of annual contributions.

Annual Participating privileges present a recurring strain on the Museum's budget when no money is received from the recipient.

2. Corporation Memberships

A. That the Director, Transurer and Secretary once a year review the people who have shown active interest in the bussum and present a slate to the Coordination Committee of those people whom they would like to see elected to the Corporation for a specified length of time. If the slate is approved by the Coordination Committee, the names will be presented to the Board of Trustees for election. After election, the President will write a letter to the new members of the Corporation welcoming them and expressing the gratitude of the Trustees.

Note: A year ago, this matter was discussed by Messrs.
Rockefeller, d'Harmoncourt, houted and hims Cable.
Mr. Masted stated that within the terms of our
Constitution and by-laws, it is possible to elect
Cor oration numbers for a stated period. The
matter was tabled because of the possibility of
misinterpretation being given to the election of
contributors to the Corporation. However, the
Department of Ambership feels that it is not
necessary to define the qualifications for election
to the Corporation. The Commating Committee would
be free to take many factors into consideration
besides the financial one -- interest, knowledge,
gifts to the Collection, etc. over a period of time.
In this way no one could be accused of buying their
way into the Museum.

B. That the Annual Corporation meeting should be made an interesting occasion where people will wish to come, express their views, offer suggestions and learn about the problems of the Museum.

Ressons:

At the present time, very few people attend the Corporationses Annual meeting or are actively interested.

Should this meeting be turned into a forum for the exchange of suggestions and comments of the Museum's program, interest might be increased and even result in more financial aid.

3. Other Bonors

A. That denors who are not members and whose gift is valued at 3500 or over be offered a year's Participating Membership with the acknowledgment. During that one year period, the denors would not be solicited for funds or memberships, but on its expiration, he should be written a letter and asked to join the Hussum in whatever category seems appropriate.

care of all those people who give gifts in kind or substantial sums of money for "special projects". This gives some recognition and yet paves the way for continuing the annual solicitation.

B. That donors who are members be sent an acknowledgment and the fact mentioned that their gift is especially appreciated in that it is over and above their membership.

Reason:

By so doing, the member will be made to realize that the donation is over and above the annual membership and he will not be surprised when he is asked to renew his membership at a later date.

4. Single Donations

That the Endowment Fund be advertised to those people who wish to give a single donation to the Museum. If the gift is over \$500, Participating Membership privileges could be granted for one year after the gift. After that, their membership status would be reviewed by the Treasurer and the Department of Membership.
