Degree awarded on basis of General Examinations; no course requirements. Students usually take 2 or 3 seminars each term, plus 1 undergraduate lecture course (not necessarily including exam and paper), for the first two years.

I term usually devoted to studying for General Examinations.

Exams:

3-hour written exam in major field

1-hour oral exams in major field and each of 3 minor fields.

Ph. D. degree awarded on completion of the dissertation, and an oral defense thereof.

Note: 4 or 5 seminars are offered each semester in western fields, and independent reading courses may be organized; seminar attendance averages about 7, but varies; all of art history divided into 8 periods, from which major field is selected.

*Obviously, the heavy course requirement at N. Y. U. is only feasible given their large teaching staff, and large enrollment. Last semester, 32 courses were offered at the graduate level, in all fields, excluding Conservation.

The elastic Harvard program presupposes their relatively large staff, and a good program of visiting professors each term. Six or seven graduate seminars are offered each semester in western fields. Drawbacks to their system include relative inaccessibility of faculty to students; burden of teaching or apprenticeship duties while studying for Generals; and that there may be as many as 15 graduate students in a seminar.

On The Campus

HREE years ago the Harvard Crimson made headlines by naming a woman to the position of managing editor for the first time in the paper's history. The Daily Princetonian has now gotten into the act with a staffer who is considerably prettier than the average Princeton undergraduate. Her name is C. Holly Hoffmeister, a junior from Carleton College and a critical language student in Japanese at Old Nassau this year. Her election to the staff was, predictably, unanimous. Princetonian Chairman Richard K. Rein claims that she brings "a new perspective" to the paper, and the perspective is more than obvious in her first feature story: it's called "First Impressions of Prince-ton Men."

Only Sleeping

The issues and controversies which animated last May's student rally at Nassau Hall are gradually finding resolution this fall. Coeducation, the incorporation of students into the decision-making processes of the University, and Princeton's link with the Institute for Defense Analyses have all been effectively-if only temporarilyremoved as foci for student protest. Despite the Princetonian's editorial declaration that an "ugly, brooding" mood has settled on the campus as the undergraduates return, a more accurate description of the state of affairs might be "normaley." President Goheen's opening address was not picketed this year as it was in 1967, but the absence of demonstrators was due more to lethargy than to any supposed conclusion of the University's internal debates. Campus controversy is only sleeping. The issues of last Spring may be done with, but they are only emblems of a philosophical dispute which remains in the University community. The dispute could easily find further expression in the problems of the future. The campus is divided between the advocates of the "sacred" and "secular" concepts of the University.

Baldly put, the positions are these: Those who argue for the "sacred" university feel that the virtue of an

institution as Princeton is its position apart from the conflicts current outside the walls. They argue that knowledge, like virtue, is its own reward, and that to make Princeton immediately responsive to mercurial social, political or economic conditions would destroy its value as a sanctuary for calm and unanxious reflection.

At the other end of the debate are the secularists, who feel that "Prince-ton in the Nation's Service" should describe not only her graduates but also the University as a corporate entity. In Princeton's resources and prestige, the secularists see weapons to be used on behalf of the causes of the day. What they ask of the University is a broader participation in programs of mass education and social welfare and a curriculum reflecting current events. While it would be difficult to characterize the "sacred" faction whose interests are, in large part, scholarly-as politically right-wing, the secularists are primarily of the left; their argument for social involvement ends at the involvement represented by the Institute for Defense Analyses, which they regard as the organ of an imperialist government.

President Goheen, in his remarks at the year's opening exercises, took note of these two factions, characterizing one as ". . . overly timid and backward-looking," while he described their counterparts on the other side as having ". . . little or no hesitation about inviting political and social turmoil to the campus." Rejecting the extremes, he sought the middle road in saving that Princeton ". . . must be judiciously responsive to those . social] needs which it can effectively help to meet as a University-that is to say, as a center for study and

Unlike Columbia, where a similar dispute has broken out in violence, Princeton's population of "secular" radicals and "sacred" reactionaries is small; a large majority stands somewhere between the two extremes in a posture of philosophical flexibility. The rapprochement symbolized by the settling of the issues of last May will probably be achieved again as new

issues arise. But they are certain to arise. Discussion and change are still underway at Princeton as the new year opens. In the fallible world of education, change is not always equivalent to progress; but to remain static is to risk stagnation and irrelevance.

Paperback Writer

Despite considerable expansion in the last few years, the Princeton Creative Arts Program remains the stepchild of the academic community. While the program expands to match continually growing student interest in the arts, there never seems to be enough available cash to finance all the expensive facilities the student artist needs. Sculpture, painting and printing studios are well-established in recently acquired Nassau Street School building, but student filmmakers are still trying to squeeze more adequate editing equipment out of a limited budget. Even in the programs already established, there is often the problem of too little money to do a big job.

When the Creative Arts Summer Fellowships were established last year to aid student artists in continuing their work during the vacation, the Committee on Creative Arts planned on four to eight grants, ranging in amount from \$250 to \$500. In light of over forty applications from interested students, the Committee found itself making thirteen awards, most of them for the minimum amount. At the end of the summer, the awardwinners have returned to campus bearing reports of the same old problem: not enough money. While all of the students appreciated the freedom they gained through the program's assistance, many felt that the lack of funds had forced the committee to spread the awards too thin. Some of the grants were inadequate to cover the expense of materials for film and sculpture-construction work, while a number of grantees were required to take considerable amounts of time away from their creative endeavors to hold regular jobs.

Despite the obstacles, however, the grant-holders were generally satisfied (continued on page 16)



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A PLAN FOR THE CREATION OF ADVISORY COUNCILS

FOR THE

ACADEMIC DIVISIONS OF PRINCETON UNIVERSITY

- 1. An Advisory Council shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees for each Department or Academic Division designated for this purpose by the President of the University. Such Councils, by virtue of their appointment by the Board of Trustees, shall have official status and their membership shall be listed in an appropriate position in the University Catalogue.
- 2. It is intended that members of the several Councils shall be persons interested in the field of the individual Department or Academic Division. In nominating the alumni members of the Advisory Council of any Department or Academic Division which has an alumni organization, special consideration shall be given to the availability of the members of such organization. Membership of the several Councils shall not be restricted to Princeton alumni, but the group appointed each year for each Department or Academic Division shall include at least one Princeton alumnus, (except that only one Princeton alumnus need be included if the Council has only three members).
- 3. Nominations presented to the Board of Trustees for membership on the several Councils shall be made by the Departments or Academic Divisions concerned, after consultation with representatives of the Graduate Council appointed for this purpose by the Chairman of the latter organization.
- 4. The number of members of each such Council shall be three or a multiple thereof not exceeding fifteen, and in each case shall be determined by the individual Department or Academic Division. The members shall serve for a term of three years, except that of those first appointed, one-third shall serve for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years.
- 5. Each Departmental Advisory Council may appoint annually one of its alumni members as the Department's representative on the Graduate Council.
- 6. Meetings of any Departmental Advisory Council with the Department or Academic Division concerned, for the purpose of consultation and conference, shall be held at such times as may be mutually agreed upon. Each Advisory Council may from time to time make reports in writing addressed to the Department or Academic Division for transmission, with appropriate comments, to the President of the University or to the President of the University and the Graduate Council.
