Dear Alfred:

When one's ambitions are as gratified as yours must have been by the splendiddopportunity that your new appointment opens up for you, the paen of a mere outsider seems like a shrill, if harmonious, note. The organizing committee could not have done more complete justice to an inherently worthy idea than they have in their choice of museum director. It is surprising that New York City has not been alive to, or at least, made some effort to meet, the need for conferring substantial recognition on such an important branch of contemporary art. But organization will make appreciation articulate, and of course appreciation will perfect organization. I can imagine how much it must mean to you to be in a position to assist so materially the branch of art in which you have been particularly interested, and I sincerely hope that financial recognition is as forthcoming as artistic recognition has been, for that is the real proof of the latter.
