FUND BEGINS STUDY OF ART MUSEUMS

The nation's art museums, now facing a major crisis in their finances and operations, will be extensively examined in a new study, the Twentieth Century Fund announced today.

Jan C. Rowan, economist, architect and former editor of Progressive Architecture magazine, will direct the critical study of the relevance of art museums to the needs of American society for the Fund.

The study will attempt to answer these fundamental questions:

- -- Is the museum in its present form an institution fulfilling a necessary social function worth preserving?
- -- Should museums change the scope and methods of their operations?
- --Should some or all of their functions be taken over by other institutions?

Mr. Rowan will direct a research team of economists, museum experts and critics. The study is scheduled for completion by November 1969.

Preliminary research will include a survey of almost all U. S. art museums through the use of questionnaires and on-the-spot interviews. A limited number of museums will also be subject to a more thorough investigation.

The study will include a historical survey, tracing the development of museums. Mr. Rowan then plans to analyze the contemporary museum in terms of the aims of those who manage them, their current problems, financing, internal organization and their uses and users.

THE TWENTIETH CENTURY FUND, a philanthropic foundation for research and public education on current economic and social questions, was founded in 1919 and endowed by Edward A. Filene. The Fund's income is administered as a public trust by a Board of Trustees and is devoted primarily to the Fund's own research activities.

Does every community need a museum? In an attempt to answer this question, the study will investigate competition among museums, community attitudes toward them and their role in the community, and their functions as schools of art, educational institutions and research centers.

In addition to an analysis of present problems, the study will report on coming changes in museum design, operation and function. It will evaluate the impact of new visual communications on traditional museum services. It also will examine the increased computerization of archives and the aims of experimental museums and exhibits.

About the Research Director

Jan C.Rowan, 45, was born in Poland and educated in England. He studied at the London School of Economics, the school of the architectural association in London and at McGill University. As an architect, he worked in the offices of LeCorbusier and I.M. Pei and now has his own practice. He was on the staff of Progressive Architecture from 1959 to 1969 and was its editor from 1963-1969. He was the recipient of the Jessie H. Neal Editorial Achievement Award from the American Business Press in 1967.

Dear Mr. Reiss:

You commented recently about the glare of the lights on the glass covering some of the paintings in the Museum's galacries, and suggested the possibility of non-glare glass. Unfortunately there is no satis-factory non-reflecting glass available so far as we can discover. We have experimented with one type of glass which does not reflect, but it has to be pressed tightly against the face of the painting to be effective. This would be very bad for most paintings and it also gives a curious effect of making the painting look like a color reproduction.

We regret very much indeed that it has been necessary to cover some of our oil paintings with glass. The hands of the public exploring the surface of a painting can be very destructive and we must protect the works of art in our collection as carefully as possible.

Gerald Gladstone, the Canadian sculptor, telephoned me from Toronto to ask for suggestions of New York State sculptors to be invited to participate in what he calls a symposium to be held in the summer of 1967 in a Toronto park.

I have your undated letter which I am afraid has waited several weeks for an answer. Your topic is an interesting one and I am sorry not to have the time to answer your questions more fully.

I can only give you a brief personal impression, none of which I would want to have quoted.

In my opinion no good museum ever wishes or tries to influence artists, although certain writers on art like to accuse us of it. It is our job to watch and study what the artists are doing and to select what we believe in to exhibit and acquire. The function of museum curators as I see it is to learn from the artists, to try to understand what they do, to select as carefully as possible from the vast reservoir, and to lead the public toward understanding and appreciation.

I doubt that any really good artist would be influenced by a museum. Anyone who has known artists knows that the real ones work from urgent inner necessity, not from a notion of what some museum may want to buy or show. However, artists influence each other continually and this is often important to their development. Major artists influence minor artists and major artists influence other major artists. The leaders of the art developments in New York since 1950, about which you ask, have their hundreds of satellites.

I do believe, however, that sometimes the announcement of a forth-coming exhibition in a museum may tempt some minor artists to make something to fit the theme of the exhibition. Such efforts are usually quite transparent and not of quality to be chosen by the museum. In other words, if this is an example of an influence by the museum on the artists, I think it is of no consequence.


