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

Dear Mr. de Menil:

I have just seen your letter of September 24 to Mr. Wheeler about our loan of a Calder to your exhibition opening October 31. I had written to Mr. Alvin Romansky on September 17 asking for particulars of the loan, which he had referred to in a recent letter, in order that we might make some definite arrangement as soon as possible.

We have two works by Calder in storage in the Museum which I are owned by the artist and not by the Museum. I believe that we shall have to lend you one of these, since there is really no typical Calder in our collection which it is practical to lend. As you probably know, we have a tremendous mobile, thirty feet in diameter, installed in our Garden, and another large mobile hanging in the stairwell of the Museum. Other than these two works we have only a very early motorized mobile, which I think would not be very suitable for your purposes, and the very small "Constellation," which we keep on view in our sculpture gallery. For these reasons I think the mobile called "Small Nine Disks," which is in storage here, would be preferable.

Calder is at present in Rio de Janeiro, and I am writing him airmail today to ask his permission to lend this mobile for your exhibition. The loan should be credited as follows: "Lent by the artist through the Museum of Modern Art, New York."

We would maintain insurance on the piece and bill you for the premium, as is our custom, and ask that you have W. S. Budworth and Sons here pack and ship it. We note that it should be sent to the Contemporary Arts Association of Houston, Inc., in care of The Museum of Fine Arts, 5700 Main Street.

I hope that Calder will have no objection to our lending this work. However, I feel I must ask his permission, as you can readily understand.

May we know the closing date of your exhibition?

I am answering your very interesting letter to Nr. Barr since he is, just now, devoting most of his time to writing.

I am very much ensemble to hear of the Nieman-Marcus Picasso exhibition and their refusal to share it. The notice which you saw in <u>Art Meass</u> about our lending a Picasso exhibition to Houston did not originate with us and the entire matter is completely theoretical at this time. The Houston people have asked us to arrange such an exhibition, based on paintings and dratings leaned by Picasso which we have had here in the Museum since before the War. Any such exhibition, however, would depend upon Picasso's willingness to cooperate and completion of arrangements with Houston. In any case, it has been spoken of for the year 1949, probably a year hence. I am sorry, therefore, that we cannot accommodate you with a Picasso exhibition at present. We shall be glad to let you know if the Houston exhibition materializes.

Thank you for your suggestion that we consider an exhibition of the work of southwestern Indians and of Henrietta Hoopes. I am afraid we have too full a schedule for the next couple of years to consider either of these possibilities. I do not remember the work of Ma-Pe-Mi, the Zia Indian, but we have shown the work of several Indians in the past and have in the Collection a fine example by Awa Tsireh.


We shall, however, let you know if the exhibition materializes and if there is a possibility of its being shown elsewhere.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Straus:

I have just returned from a brief vacation following the very pleasant evening spent with you on your recent visit to New York.

As I promised I am enclosing our catalog of circulating exhibitions available during the coming winter which may contain some useful materials for the general program of Houston's new contemporary arts association. As I pointed out in our conversation I do not regard these of sufficient scope or importance to serve as the opening exhibition of your organization.

Philip Johnson, in charge of our Architecture Department, has just returned from visiting the de Menils in Houston and reports you are still considering the Picasso opening we discussed during your visit. I wonder if you have found someone among your group who would assemble this show or whether you are interested in this Museum's organising such an exhibition. In 1944, we organized a Picasso exhibition containing about 50 paintings and drawings for the Sociedad de Arte Moderno in Mexico City. The items in the show covered the entire period of Picasso's activity and were borrowed from public and private collections in this country and abroad. The complete undertaking took considerable research and some time to assemble and represented an outlay of several thousand dollars.

If we can be of help do not hesitate to call upon us. Again my sincerest thanks.
