
We can continue, however, only with the further cooperation of the city and of individuals and groups committed to the arts as an integral part of society.

The artists selected were chosen because I felt they would make interesting use of the unique space on both the two story pier undermeath the Brooklyn Bridge, and the flat concrete pier (Pier 14). The completed works show without question the success of the project, and the exciting possibilities of other such situations.

I believe this to be the first time so many artists have been able to take advantage of our city waterfront. To make even this brief experiment possible, the most extensive hegotiations with various city departments were necessary.

I am writing to propose my new performance piece for your space:
a new series of narrative tableaux performed by one woman. Some
earlier related tableaux from one-person shows at the Whitney

Museum and Finch College can be seen in the accompanying photographs.

The accompanying slides represent one-fourth of a photonarrative
installation piece which also deals with one woman subject.

The tableaux I am working on are silent. The performer uses three or four pieces of furniture set against a long wall. I need a very large space for this performance because the viewers must be separated by fifty feet from the performance space. This performance space has to be forty feet wide. I need the loft for four weeks—two to install and rehearse, because the movements are very slow and the poses are very precise, and the timing of blackouts that separate the tableaux is also precise. The other two weeks would be to exhibit the piece. So much work and material goes into a piece like this that for me to show it only once or twice would not make it available to enough people to see.

I would like to try to get contributors to the Institute to cover excluding the expenses. These will not be great, probably around \$300 exxxxixx a mailing. I would like to do this project before April 15 or after




















Chalk Shadows: 6 lines London. Work in progress

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





Art has finally found its way to Coney Island: This month will see the culmination of a unique merger between art and politics with the opening of an exhibition of sculpture by Jene Highstein in The Condemnation Blight Sculpture Workshop, 1615 Hart Place, Coney Island. It is sponsored by The Institute for Art and Urban Resources.

The Condemnation Blight Sculpture Workshop is actually the former Neptune Beverage Company, now owned by the Economic Development Administration of the City of New York. Kenneth Patton, Administrator of E.D.A., made the building available for use by the Institute. Temporarily unused, this site will eventually be part of a larger E.D.A. plan to develop the industrial potential of Coney Island.

Coney Island has long been known for its famous rides and hot dogs. But it is also a tight family neighborhood, full of small, neat houses abiding side by side with warehouses and light industry.

Highstein has worked in the Sculpture Workshop since last December. This exhibition is the culmination of that year's effort. Other young New York artists have also made use of the facility, including Robert Grosvenor and Richard Nonas.

The Institute for Art and Urban Resources is a private, non-profit organization. One of the primary purposes of the Institute, according to its Director, Alanna Heiss, is to promote interesting art events in unlikely urban settings that would otherwise go unused or underutilized. Thanks to the farsightedness of Patton, this has been possible in Coney Island.

Highstein's sculpture provides a perfect foil for this area. His tall, vertical forms, constructed of balanced telephone poles or hollow iron tubing, reflect the industrial quality of the neighborhood and draw the eye to other, like forms in the immediate environment. They contrast boldly with Cropsey Canal which flows peacefully along behind the Workshop.

The exhibition will be open from 1 until 6 P.M. every Sunday afternoon in October. For further information, please contact The Institute for Art and Urban Resources, 11 John Street, New York, New York 10038. The phone is 212-233-1096.

Time was a problem, but the Institute hired a photographer (at the cost of \$150) to go out withq a wide-angle lens and take shots of the land and bubddings the artist laid out the poster but although he tried every day, could not make contact with the young woman from E.D.A. who was to lay out the graphics and arrange for the printing. She come down with the mumps and was incommunicado during the entire tome the poster could have been turned out.

Consequently, we had no real public publicity except for a simple map card which the artist had printed up at his own expense (which mentioned niether the Institute nor the E.D.A. land on invitation to the goat-roast which was who only sent to forty or

fifty people.

In spite of all, the show received certain critical attention, particularly from museum staff members. I/would like to see curators more interested on possibilities outside the museum staff. possibilities outside the museum proper, perhaps in the boroughs, Situations like this one which are successfully received by the critics will encourage them to be more open.

# Also, it seems we had a fair show of interested public, primarily from the Brooklyn area. who poked around the area, explored the neighborhood, and re-visited the rides and generally had a pleasant Sunday afternoon.

The temporary use of the beverage company building is very much appreciated; During the eight months it served as a sculpture fabrication plant it was a good experience for all concerned. We are sincerely most grateful to E.D.A. for

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

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

# Police Station Aiding Arts

A 19th-century three-story police precinct stationhouse in a high-crime area of the Crown Heights-Bedford Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn is becoming a home for a group of artists, poets and could be supported by the second of the second of

sculptors.
In an arrangement with the Institute for Arts and Urban Resources—a federally financed organization operating under the aegis of the National Endowment for the Arts—portions of the old sculptors. Arts—portions of the old 80th precinct building, at 653 Grand Avenue, have been reserved for artistic en-deavors, on a rent-free basis, in exchange for assistance in establishing better commu-

nity relations.

The 80th Precinct was merged recently with the 77th precinct, and headquarters for the combined unit was set up in a new building at 127 Utica Avenue. Only 38 policemen continued to use the 80th precinct station-house on Grand Avenue, and house on Grand Avenue, and their space requirements were limited to the ground floor and the basement of the old structure.

quite a bit of un used space in the building. The Institute for Arts and Urban Resources came up with the plan to allow artists, who sorely need space for their work, but could not afford high rentals, to utilize the stationhouse for that purpose if they gave free to permit the children to observe them as they work.

Capt. Adam Butcher, commanding officer of the newly merged police unit, implemented the program after lengthy consultations with his superiors. "It's an excellent way to bring children in contact with the creative spirit," Captain Butcher said. "And it will also bring children." spirit," Captain Butcher said.
"And it will also bring children in closer contact with the police. The whole idea of neighborhood police team No. 4 [which occupies the building] is to produce a better understanding between the people living in the area and the police department. This plan fit in perfectly."

### Emphasis on Children

The painters, writers and sculptors who will be using the building have been specially screened. These are people who are not only exceptionally talented but who also understand what we are ceptionally talented but who also understand what we are trying to do and who have the ability to reach children and to be patient with them." Captain Butcher emphasized.

The 80th Precinct stationhouse was built in 1892, in a Romanesque style typical of police stations of that era. There are dozens of large windows and northern exposure, on the third floor. It is unobstructed by any other buildings in the vicinity and features a picturesque spiral staircase leading to the roof. and sculptors. Throughout the building are well-lit rooms, previously used by detective squads; these are to be turned over to other artists.

There is also a equipped barn, with hayloft mechanisms still intact, and a paddywagon shed. These units will be used in the creation of large sculpture works that require lifting devices.

According to Mrs. Alanna
Heiss, director of the Institute for Arts and Urban Resources, there are many
empty and partially empty
buildings throughout the city
that are municipally or federally owned, and she hopes that these buildings can be made available to artists "as a means of alleviating their enormous expenses for studio space, which they cannot af-ford, in a space-hungry city."

The idea is experimental and expansion of the project depends largely on how well it works in the 80th precinct. Captain Butcher said that all 38 members of his special neighborhood police task force are becoming actively involved.

"Last week we had a puppet parade to welcome creative people to the sta-tionhouse and to let the neighborhood know about the program," he said. "Some of those artists are very attractive young women and some of my men decided to buy easels and brushes. They felt they might have latent paint-
