


A GROUP SHOW - PAINTING AT P.S. 1

A large group exhibition of 40 painters will open at the exhibition space at P.S. 1 (PROJECT STUDIOS ONE), the experimental art center of the Institute for Art and Urban Resources, May 2 and will remain on view through May 29, 1977. The galleries at P.S. 1 are open to the public Thursday through Sunday 1-6 P.M.

This painting show bears no thematic connection. The purpose is to show a large number of paintings that span several areas of interest in the field. No curatorial comments were assumed by the organizer of the show, rather the selected artists had to choose their own paintings for the show and install thier rooms themselves with the utmost cooperation and understanding of the individual requirements for each painting.

P.S. 1 is located at 21-01 46th Road, Long Island City, Queens, six minutes from Grand Central Station and Times Square. Take the Flushing line #7 to Hunter's Point station, or the E or F lines from the Museum of Modern Art, two stops, to 23rd St. Ely Avenue station. By car, after Midtown Tunnel, take the first exit, 21st Street and Van Alst, continue 3 blocks on 21st Street to P.S. 1.

The Institute for Art and Urban Resources is a private not-for- profit corporation which sponsors and organizes art exhibitions, performances, and workspace programs for contemporary artists in the boroughs of Manhattan and Queens. The programs include Workspace, New Urban Landscape, 10 Bleecker Atreet, the Clocktower, and Project Studios One. Major support for P.S. 1 is received from the New Yrok State Council on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

A Painting Show, P.S. 1, 21-04 46th Rd. & 21st St., L.I. City, 1-6 PM, Thurs-Sun, to May 29.

It is difficult to get a handle on an exhibition like this, 41 painters are represented by one work apiece. Accord-ing to the press release: "This painting show bears no thematic connection. The purpose is to show a large number of pain-tings that span several areas of interest." No thematic connection to what? I think what is meant is that the paintings in the show bear no thematic connection to each other, which is indeed the case, although one might indicate that X,Y, and Z share some interest in texture as opposed to A.B. and C who don't. Such a procedure is necessarily countered by X and A being alike because they used representation or Y and B being alike because their canvases are shaped. And what about K or M? And so forth.

Although there is not "something for everyone" — realism, for instance, is not included — the show is a generous sampling of what is going on in painting presently, not all of it terribly exciting, not all of it particularly original, but some of it problematic, biting, and even gorgeous.

John Torreano's two-part painting definitely fits my last category. One part is red; one part is green. Both parts are heavily impastoed and "planted" with cut glass of various colors, fake jewels that have no place in ordinary, sensible painting. The red part is slightly smaller than its green counterpart, as if it could slide to the right and fit inside.

The show is a potpourri. How else can you characterize a sampling that includes among many interesting paintings a Brad Davis horizontal floral painting, an outline horse by Susan Rothenberg, a Mary Heilmann red and yellow, a smashing Sylvia Mangold painting that compares rulers (one flat to the picture-plane, the other in slight perspective), a mysterious Denise Green, and even a Neil Jenny?

By potpourri, I do not mean, I hasten to add, as my not too subtle dictionary would have it, a mixture of dried flower petals, a musical medley, a collection of literary extracts, or a rotten pot.

If nothing else, the show underlines the various attitudes towards painting now holding forth, from monochromatic abstraction to forms and styles not yet named and perhaps too elusive to be clearly verbalized.

I advise a visit. Long Island City is not that far away. From Times Square you take the Flushing Line and get off at Hunter's Point, which is at most a five minute ride.

The installation, mostly determined by the artists themselves, is fine, and the new exhibition space at this re-claimed ancient grammar school is serviceable indeed, even elegant.

P.S. 1 is a project of the Institute for Art and Urban Resources, the folks that also bring us the Clocktower on Leonard Street, in the city. Some of the policies of P.S. 1 have been criticized of late, but on the whole, although there is always room for improvement, I feel that P.S. 1 is offering a valuable contribution to art.

While you are there, explore some of the installations and the artist studios open to the public. I did. Lucio Pozzi's "Four Windows," now in their final. "blue" version, Connie Beckley's sound installation in the auditorium, Richard Jackson's wall paintings, and John Fekner's paper "mementos" — cotton pulp castings of various pipes and moldings in the building, displayed in his studio, as part of an environment, and throughout the building, where it is often hard to tell apart "real" and "paper."

There's always something going on at P.S. 1; installations, exhibitions, artists working, dance concerts, performances, even poetry readings, if you time it right. When I was there Alanna Heiss, the executive director, was busy shepherding around a group of visiting Belgians. Asked if I wanted to meet them, I declined. Too busy looking for art.



Itinerary for visit of Mrs. Mondale to P.S. 1

- Mrs. Joan Mondale and the Greeting Committee will enter into the basement-Sculpture Studio. Alan Bertoldi, resident sculptor will be introduced. He has used the basement for one year and cleared out the entire space.
- 3. From the basement the Group will continue up through the back staircase to the second floor New Wing of the New Wing of the building. All studios in the Studio Space Program will be open. The Group will stop at Room 207 N.W., the studio of Jacqueline Freedman, a Queens painter who does intimate abstract paintings. From there they will stop at Room 204A N.W., the studio of Emilio Segares, a young artist who does abstract minimal paintings.
- 4. They will then return to the back staircase, continuing up to the third floor New Wing, and visit the studio of Ron Gorchov, a painter, in Room 306 N.W., then the studio of Frances Hynes, a Queens painter in Room 304B N.W.. Ms. Hynes does realistic paintings and drawings using the windows of the studio to reflect interior and exterior views. The next stop will be in Room 302 N.W., artist Claudia DeMonte, who dows autobiographical conceptual work. The last visit on the 3rd Floor New Wing will be in Room 301 N.W.
- 5. The Group will pass through central staircase to the Old Wing of the third floor. The first stop will be in Room 301 O.W. the studio of Hap Tivey, an artist who reconstructed his studio to create an illusionistic images with fluorescent lights.

From there they will proceed to the Auditorium where Batya Zamir, a dancer who uses floors, walls and ceiling for her dance will rehearse.

- 6. They will continue down the side staircase, Old Wing to the second floor of the Old Wing. The first stop is that of artist Vera Manzi-Shacht, Room 202 O.W., who does large paper evironments that deal with the changes of light during the day. They will then visit the studio of Lucio Pozzi, Room 201 O.W., an artist who has constructed vaulted arches presently painted in Blue. He was reviewd by Mr. Thomas Hess, critic of New York Magazine in a recent article.
- 7. Mrs. J. Mondale and the Greeting Committee will continue down the central staircase to the first floor Old Wing to the Gallery at the end of the corridor. Sculptor, Richard Nonas and painter, Denise Green who is presently participating in the Painting Show, will greet Mrs. Joan Mondale and the Committee. They will be escorted through the 6 rooms of the Gallery, beginning to the right. They will go through all the rooms of the Painting Show exhibition to Room #6 of the Gallery, where there will be a small reception held with between 50 to 75 artists and heads of cultural organizations from Manhattan and Queens.
