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

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Education

The audience reached by the Department of Education's school programs mirrored the cultural diversity of New York City, and the department is working to establish closer ties with communitybased organizations in order to reach new audiences more effectively. This year's programs helped thousands of students to understand the different approaches to interpreting art, and to make sense of art in the context of contemporary society. Through collaboration with the Lincoln Center Institute, programs for schools, teacher training, and in-museum work with students, the Museum served over two thousand teachers and sixty thousand students from kindergarten to grade twelve.

Programs for families were expanded this year with the introduction of Family Hours. The Natural Heritage Trust continued to support our program of gallery talks. This spring, the Museum Education Consortium, a collaboration among seven major museums' education departments including our own, completed its first interactive video prototype. Research on the use and effectiveness of it has involved visitors at all seven museums during the summer and fall of 1990.

A series of three lectures accompanying the exhibition Picasso and Braque was part of a program of lectures, panel discussions, and a reading of the poetry of Pier Paolo Pasolini, that accompanied this year's major exhibitions. In addition, a panel discussion, "The Aga Khan Awards: Modernization and Continuity," addressed the issue of appropriate architecture for non-Western societies in transition. In a productive collaboration between the Departments of Education, Photography, and Film, a program of films, The Photographer's Image in Motion Pictures, was organized to complement the exhibition Photography Until Now.

On November 30, 1989, the Museum participated with many other arts institutions in "A Day without Art," a national day of mourning and call for action in response to the AIDS crisis. A memorial service organized through the Department of Education, In Memoriam: A Gathering of Hope, was held in the Garden Hall. Participants in this deeply moving event included the actress Jane Smith, whose daughter died of AIDS last year, Leonard Bernstein, who led a performance of his recent work In Memoriam, for piano and voices, and the artist David Wojnarowicz.

Library and Archives

The idea of a library devoted to the documentation and study of modern art is as old as the Museum itself, and Alfred H. Barr, Jr.'s conception of a public reference library for the Museum was realized in early 1933. Since that time, it has attained an international reputation both for the depth and comprehensiveness of its collection, and for the rare and unique materials found in it. In May 1990, a Library Trustee Committee was established with Mrs. Melville Wakeman Hall as Chairman. A distinguished group of collectors has agreed to serve on the Committee, whose goals will be to assist the expansion of the Library collection through gifts, purchases, and the raising of acquisition funds. Besides helping to maintain the excellence of the collection, the committee will assist the director of the Library in building a comprehensive collection of publications and manuscripts documenting the international avant-garde since 1950. Mrs. Hall initiated a special Library Purchase Fund with a very generous gift, which was subsequently matched by her brother, Walter Annenberg, in honor of Mrs. Hall. Members of the new committee have also made contributions to this fund.

The Schweitzer Family Fund for Library acquisitions was also formally constituted this year. We are very grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Peter William Schweitzer for their generosity, and to the Estate of Marianne W. Martin for a bequest in support of research. The Art Museum Library Consortium, of which the Museum's Library is a member, was fortunate to receive, in addition to support from The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, two substantial grants, from the Charles E. Culpeper Foundation and the H. W. Wilson Foundation, toward its program of retrospective conversion of cataloguing records into machine-readable form.

A notable acquisition was the P.A.D.D. (Political Art Documentation and Distribution) Archives. This gift of the Executive Committee of P.A.D.D. represents a decade of collecting documents, posters, publications, and other items, including some correspondence, by and about artists of many countries who are concerned with social art and activism. The P.A.D.D. Archives were used extensively for research in preparation for the Museum's 1988 exhibition Committed to Print.

The Museum Archives, in its second year of operation, served a growing number of researchers. The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, with the Reed Foundation and the National Historical Publications and Records Commission, continued to support the Museum Archives. Its holdings were enhanced this year by gifts of the papers of Dorothy C. Miller and Monroe Wheeler, and additions to the Alfred H. Barr, Jr., Papers, from the Estate of Margaret S. Barr.

Publications

The Museum launched an important new program with a three-year grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. It will encourage scholarly research and writing by members of the Museum staff, focusing on the permanent collection, and the grant will support the publication of an annual journal to disseminate the results of this scholarship. The Mellon grant also included an endowment component to extend this important work beyond the grant period. As a partial match of this gift, the Edward John Noble Foundation committed a major grant to this endowment. John Elderfield, Director, Department of Drawings, is serving as director of this new program.

The year's publications accompanying exhibitions included several outstanding contributions to their respective fields. Photography Until Now, by John Szarkowski, was the Museum's first publication to survey the history of that medium since Beaumont Newhall's celebrated book Photography: 1839-1937. The black-and-white plates were reproduced in the tritone process to provide accurate and fine reproductions. Picasso and Braque: Pioneering Cubism provided not only an important essay by William Rubin, defining the complex issues explored in the exhibition, but a detailed

chronology prepared by Judith Cousins, Curator for Research, Department of Painting and Sculpture, that examined the two artists' activities during the critical years covered by the exhibition.

Among other notable books this year was Stephen Harvey's Directed by Vincente Minnelli, published with Harper and Row. It is the first fullscale assessment of that director's work, and was written with the cooperation of MGM/UA, Liza Minnelli, and Vincente Minnelli prior to his death in 1986. Architectural Drawings of the Russian Avant-Garde offered a comprehensive introduction to an important body of work, putting it into the context of political, social, and cultural developments in the early years of the Soviet state.

Mies van der Rohe: Critical Essays, edited and with an introduction by Franz Schulze, incorporates contributions by Wolf Tegethoff, Richard Pommer, Franz Neumeyer, and James Ingo Freed. An outgrowth of the Museum's historic centennial exhibition of Mies's work in 1986, the book presents provocative new writings on Mies.

Finance and Development

Revenues from most major sources increased during the past year. Income from admissions, which included a surcharge for the nearly 350,000 visitors who attended Picasso and Braque: Pioneering Cubism, grew to \$4.8 million, based on total attendance of 1,408,340. Income from auxiliary operations was enhanced by profits from The MoMA Design Store, which opened in November 1989. Dear Herb,

On January 5th the Archives Committee of PAD met, and one of the things discussed was the matter of circulating loans. I enclose a copy of a loan sheet that will henceforth accompany all loans and would like to know how you feel about it. Would this have been helpful to you when you last borrowed material, and would your passing it along to third parties along with the poseers have helped prement the damage that occurred?

Apropos of that damage, the committee also made the following recommendations. While all posters were damaged, after several hours I was able to remove the tape and cement from all but 3, and 2 of theseshad important information on the back that was destroyed by the tape. One of the 3 was the "Shut Them Down" poster by Jerry Kearns; there is a duplicate copy in the files, so the committee waived a penalty. The other 2, the 2 with type on the verso, should be replaced, or it was felt that a penalty of \$5 each should be requested. In practical terms, one of them should be easily replaceable---it's the "Nuclear America" one from the War Resisters' League. The other, from the opening of the L.A. Women's Building in 1975, is probably difficult or impossible to get now. Please let us know whether you would prefer to pay the fee or get the replacements for one or both.

Hope this seems as fair to you as it did to the committee. We <u>do</u> appreciate the additional posters you brought to the files. Because we are still in the process of developing the best system for loans, any feedback from you is much appreciated.

PAD (Political Art Documentation) is a newly organized collection of all kinds of documentation on international socially concerned art. It is administered by a loose-knit group of artists and other artworkers who meet the Second Sunday of each month at Printed Matter (7 Lispenard St., NYC 10013; 212-925-0325). It is housed in a big airy space at PS 64 on 9th St. and Avenue B under the auspices of the Lower East Side umbrella group-Seven Loaves.

PAD began because it became clear to those of us who were travelling a lot that politically oriented artists, lacking coverage in mainstream art media, too rarely communicated with their colleagues in other cities, states and countries. Since art grows from art, this kind of networking seems particularly important if the increasing interest in social concerns is to meet its full potential of outreach and political effectiveness.



Dear Day & Dennis,

I'm sorry that it's taken so long to answer your September letter to the PADD Archive. I am sorry that you had to write it because it concerns a situation that we have tried to prewent happening. Every time someone borrows material from the archive we inform them that 1) the archive does not own any copyrights and that if they want it for reproduction they must contact the artists, and 2) that if it is used for exhibition they should send us and the artists full documentation. I am aware that, despite people agreeing to these strictures, they all too often neglect to follow through. Usually the archive itself does not know what use has been made of the material. We will try to be more forceful in making people aware of these things, and hopes that will improve the situation.


Another thing we have had some trouble with, and that I believe has affected you, is people losing or giving away material borrowed from the Archive. As we require a refundable deposit for all loans, the borrower then goes back to the artist to get a replacement copy for the archive, so that the full deposit will be returned. This practice is contrary to our policy. Please do not feel obligated to replace material; only do so if you want to. We are very grateful to those who have given material for the archive and feel it is our responsibility to take good care of it. We want to encourage others to do the same! It does not seem appropriate that those who have been careless should further impose on those whose generosity has made the archive possible. Obviously, if something has been lost, we do like to replace it, but to some artists it's beginning to appear as if we keep losing their pieces over and over again. The archive committee feels that when spmething is lost or damaged, the borrower should pay for it so that the second time around we can at least offer the artists payment for another copy.

I hope things work smoother in the future. Thanks for all your beautiful, potent work. Please keep us informed of what you're doing. I'm amazed you aren't on the mailing list; I've arranged to put you on, but if there's any problem, give me a ring.

The Committee is still refining its loan procedures. The only loan undertaken so far resulted in the following:

-- time of return of material was 5 weeks, although the event for which things were borrowed took only one day

-- all posters were returned, but they had rubber cement covered by masking tape across the top of each back

-- most cement and tape was removed by an Archives Committee
member, but it took over 2 hours and resulted in some paper loss

-- 3 posters could not be resored at all, and 2 of these had important information on the back under the tape

The refundable deposit (an uncashed check made out to PAD) was returned to the borrower, pending full discussion by the Committee. At the January 5th meeting it was decided to send a sheet (copy attached herewith) giving a specific due date and minimum care requirements to all future borrowers. It was I believe in 1981, that I donated my entire collection of political art including my entire collection of political art including rare books and pamphlets | and the notes from 6 years of research into the topic of Art and Politics in the U.S. I gave these things in the good faith that the Archives of

Political ARt would develop into an open library where artists and historians would have access to the material. Shortly after my gift to the Archives was received, I ended my association with PADD. I did how- materials ever still believe at the time that the placing of my material in the Archives of Political Art constituted the best place for its preservation and widest dissemination. For that reason, I did not withdraw the material when I left PADD.

Since then, PADD has moved a few times. When in the summer of 1984, I needed access to my notes in order to prepare a paper on Art and Anarchism which was requested for a conference on Anarchism in 1984 at Venice, Idscovered that 6 years of research had been lost by the Archives. At that time, I requested entrance into the ARchives to search for them

myselfand was told absolutely not. I then requested entrance into the archives to retrieve everything else I had placed there. I was told to Somit a written list. I have no written list. What I do remember will be at the end of this letter.

In the summer of 1984, I did not have time to argue with Ms. Moore. I was too busy re-researching my subject and preparing it for Venice. Upon my return to New YOrk, one thing led to another, and I have not been able to sit down and compose this letter Until today.

I am formally requesting entrance to the ARchive of Political Art of PADD for the purpose of retrieving any and all materials which I placed there under the fictional agreement that these things would be preserved and made acessible to researchers. I am so concerned and so angered at the treatment of my materials and myself that if I am not allowed entry into the Archives for the purpose of retrieving my materials I am ready to institute a law suit or a court ordered search or whatever is necessary to get my things out of the Archives/ If I do not hear from a representative of the Archives by DEc.1. 1985, the archives will be hearing from my lawyer. I fervently hope that this will not be necessary.





Dear Herb,

On January 5th the Archives Committee of PAD met, and one of the things discussed was the matter of circulating loans. I enclose a copy of a loan sheet that will henceforth accompany all loans and would like to know how you feel about it. Would this have been helpful to you when you last borrowed material, and would your passing it along to third parties along with the posters have helped prevent the damage that occurred?

Apropos of that damage, the committee also made the following recommendations. While all posters were damaged, after several hours I was able to remove the tape and cement from all but 3, and 2 of these had important information on the back that was destroyed by the tape. One of the 3 was the "Shut Them Down" poster by Jerry Kearns; there is a duplicate copy in the files, so the committee waived a penalty. The other 2, the 2 with type on the verso, should be replaced, or it was felt that a penalty of \$5 each should be requested. In practical terms, one of them should be easily replaceable---it's the "Nuclear America" one from the War Resisters' League. The other, from the opening of the L.A. Women's Building in 1975, is probably difficult or impossible to get now. Please let us know whether you would prefer to pay the fee or get the replacements for one or both.

Hope this seems as fair to you as it did to the committee. We <u>do</u> appreciate the additional posters you brought to the files. Because we are still in the process of developing the best system for loans, any feedback from you is much appreciated.

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
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
