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



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### UPDATE:

Michael Anderson and Nancy Cincotta, artists arrested in Brooklyn for activities in P.A.D.'s 'Death and Taxes' show, went before the Brooklyn Criminal Court on June 22nd. An Adjournment with Contemplation of Dismissal (ACD) was offered to the two defendants which they accepted. The ACD is a 'no decision' ruling that adjourns minor criminal cases for a period of 6 months at which point the case is dropped. The decision to take the ACD will, in effect, take the case out of the criminal court system.

Anderson and Cincotta are now planning to follow this up by filing civil charges against the police for violation of 1st Ammendment Rights, illegal arrest and destruction of property/ evidence. The June 22nd decision to take the AGD is making it so that the issues can be fought from the offensive in Civil Court rather than from the defensive in Criminal Court.

A lawyer has not yet been found to represent this case in Civil Court. Anyone with information that might be helpful in this regard should call Michael Anderson at: 499-9108



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

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# What Happens to 53% of the Federal Tax Dollar?

Firehouses shut down, libraries closed, few summer jobs for teenagers, street crime increasing, day care centers desperately needed, slums needing to be rebuilt, our parks deteriorating, the City continually on the verge of bankruptcy.

Each year New Yorkers pay Washington \$11 billion in individual income taxes. But Washington returns only \$8 billion in jobs, services, and aid to the City. So New Yorkers lose \$3 billion in taxes to Washington!

Why do we lose so much money?

Because of welfare? NO, past wars and preparation for future wars make up the bulk of Federal spending! Out of every tax dollar you pay through withholding or with your 1040 form, 35¢ goes to the military (which gets a whopping \$126 billion this year) and 18¢ goes to past wars (veterans and interest on the national debt)—that's 53¢ out of every dollar. Welfare amounts to only 7¢ on the dollar.

Not only does this spending rob us of needed tax dollars to improve our cities and the quality of our lives, but it is inflationary. In addition, our current military posture is a threat to world security. Only through disarmament, peace conversion, and nonviolent civilian defense can we achieve true security.

## **HEGEMONY**

Hegemony was probably taken directly into English from fw egemonia, Gk, rw egemon, Gk – leader, ruler, often in the sense of a state other than his own. Its sense of a political predominance, usually of one state over another, is not common before C19, but has since persisted and is now fairly common, together with hegemonic, to describe a policy expressing or aimed at political predominance. More recently hegemonism has been used to describe specifically 'great power' or 'superpower' politics, intended to dominate others; (indeed hegemonism has some currency as an alternative to IMPERIALISM (q.v.)).

The word has become important in one form of C20 Marxism, especially from the work of Gramsci. In its simplest use it extends the notion of political predominance from relations between states to relations between social classes, as in bourgeois hege-

mony. But the character of this predominance can be seen in a way which produces an extended sense in many ways similar to earlier English uses of hegemonic. That is to say, it is not limited to matters of direct political control but seeks to describe a more general predominance which includes, as one of its key features, a particular way of seeing the world and human nature and relatiouships. It is different in this sense from the notion of 'world-view', in that the ways of seeing the world and ourselves and others are not just intellectual but political facts, expressed over a range from institutions to relationships and consciousness.

The idea of **hegemony**, in its wide sense, is then especially important in societies in which electoral politics and public opinion are significant factors, and in which social practice is seen to depend on consent to certain dominant ideas which in fact express the needs of a dominant class.

# REAGAN TO PROPOSE BATTLESHIPS' RETURN

Cuba and Nicaragua were warned against shipments of arms to El Salvador by Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr., who told reporters that Cuban activity has reached a peak no longer acceptable in this herhisphere, whether in El Salvador, Honduras or Guatemala, and that if the "externally managed" arms flow continued the United States would "deal with it at the source."

# Baker Supports Added Advisers For El Salvador

A dispatch of 150 U.S. military advisers to El Salvador was backed by Senator Howard H. Baker Jr., the majority leader. After meeting with President Reagan, Mr. Baker said that noncombat advisers were being considered to help the Salvadoran Government in its fight against left-wing insurgents. The Administration has made no final decision.

#### International

A Pentagon report on El Salvador said that its army is so poorly prepared to fight the Marxist guerrillas that it has "no hope" of defeating them. A State Department memorandum on a briefing for embassies of allied countries, quoted Secretary of State Alexander M. Hang Jr., as saying that the United States "will not remain passive" to what he described as a "systematic, well-financed, sophisticated effort to impose a Communist regime in Central America." He also said that Cuba was the main source of the alleged military intervention in El Salvador.



One week before April 15, the War Resisters League is sponsoring a series of events leading up to Tax Day, including a leafletting at noon every day outside the IRS headquarters at 120 Church Street (at Murray St.), and an April 15 noon rally with speakers, singers and leafletting. At the final rally the War Resisters League plans to give checks of tax resistance money to groups who have been cut off by Reagan's economic cuts. The WRL also plans civil disobedience actions in the Public Assistance area of the IRS headquarters at Church and Murray, by giving out anti-war literature to the thousands of people who wait many hours for tax assistance in the days before the tax deadline. Artists may plan to work directly with the WRL on their projects in the week before tax day.

The April 12 general second Sunday meeting of PAD (8 p.m. at Printed Matter) will also be devoted to presentations by artists of their tax-work-in-progress. Come, participate, get ideas!
