Thank you for your letter of March 12 informing me of what has happened to my picture by Ingres. The picture was not insured but I do not believe that the accident you mention is of very great importance. I think I would rather have the repair work done in New York. However, I shall see for myself when I come to San Diego. I will then decide on the best course to follow.

I have not yet recovered. I must now wait for the results of a very serious X Ray examination before I can leave. I shall know by Monday and in case my condition does not permit me to travel I shall wire you immediately in order to enable you to cancel my lecture of March 21st.

I wish to call your attention to the fact that "L'Estaque" by Cézanne also known as "L'Usine" is not in its original frame as I received it from London only after the picture had been shipped to Los Angeles. The original frame of the "Maternité" was also delivered to me after I sent you the picture. Therefore, in case someone of your institute is interested in this picture, please note that it has to be changed, the present one belonging to JULIUS LOWY, INC. frame makers in New York who lent them to me. The same applies to "Marissel" by Corot.



Dear Mr. Rosenberg,

This morning the Ingres and the little Corot have at last reached us, and thank you very much for them. We must report to you that upon unpacking the Ingres, we noticed several wide streaks on the surface of the painting in various places, rather wide in some places, and rather strong white marks. On rubbing certain streaks that were over to the right, about 11 inches from the right hand side and about 13 inches from the top, we find they had definitely gone into the varnish. There were also white spots at the top which could not be rubbed off with an old piece of linen. At the left of the rose garland around the head of the subject there were marks; on rubbing off, we find there were streaks into the varnish. Also, on line with the shoulder and half way between the subject's right shoulder and the edge of the canvas at the left of the pic ture, there were three or four other diagonal impressions, which on being rubbed left slight impressions in the varnish. At the point where the dress of the subject comes against the fur thrown over the chair, there are several streaks of similar character. At various other points there are spots. Several little splotches occur where the varnish has been rubbed at the left of the inscription, and up at the right hand corner of the canvas there are splotches where the varnish has apparently deteriorated and may have happened before being shipped to ud.

We called in the insurance adjuster of the Express Company, which had delivered the box, and upon going very carefully through the box in which the painting was packed, no trace of chalk or other white substance was found. He therefore feels, as do we, that the marks were caused before the painting was shipped, and were not caused during shipment. The painting had been turned over to the Bekins Van and Storage Company for packing, and, in our opinion they are the people responsible for the condition described, and not the Express Company. We think that a claim should be placed with the Bekins Van & Storage Company for the charge necessary to restore the surface to perfect condition again. We had to pay Bekins a charge of \$12.47 for the boxing of the Ingres and the Corot, as the paintings were delivered to us C.O.D., and this charge was included in the total charge made for delivery by Express of the paintings.

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Don't be unduly alarmed about the condition of the Ingres. It can be taken care of by an artist right here, and we will be glad to have it treated if you will duly authorize it. The cost will probably be \$10. or \$15.

The condition of the Corot is perfectly all right, except for some little unimportant chips out of the frame.

We are delighted to have these paintings, and have already hung them in the show. I hope that you are feeling much better, and that we shall have the pleasure of having you with usnext week,

Dear Mr. Rosenberg,

I received your wire this morning, asking for the opening date of our French exhibition. First, let me thank you again for the loan of the various pictures. I have decided that, in regard to the Picasso's, the pictures as shown in the two photographs are sufficiently representative for our purpose, and that we had better forego the privilege of having any more right now.

You ask about the possibility of a lower figure on the Renoir "Maternite." Would you sell that painting for \$16,000? If so, maybe we could do some business. I do not know. But I would like to know how you would consider that figure. Perhaps I might be able to do something.

In regard to the opening of the show: including this morning, the shipment was a very indefinite quantity. Later in the day, a number of boxes came in. We are going to instal the show just as soon as we can now, and expect it will be on view by Saturday noon, March 8th. We have a talk announced for Sunday afternoon, so will probably open the doors for that reason by then.

We are interested to know that you are coming out next week, and I would like to know what day you might be out here, and what days you might be in this region, so that if possible we can arrange a talk by you, at least an informal talk. It will take several days to make such arrangements, so we would have to know several days in advance. Would you therefore please give me a choice of three days, any one of which you might be able to be here, say for an afternoon or evening, to give a talk. Would you be able to talk on Picasso and what led up to him, -- from the time of the beginning of Impressionism, and maybe a bit earlier, and carrying on, including certain phases of art with which Picasso has some kind of connection? I understood that you would be glad to do this voluntarily, without a fee? I will expect to hear from you either by wire or airmail letter, and will be glad to know that we are going to be able to see you here.

Mon cher Gaston,

Votre lettre du 13 Juillet m'est arrivée très rapidement puisqu'elle m'est parvenue le 22. Inutile de vous dire combien j'ai été heureux de recevoir des nouvelles de vous et de Jeannine.

Nous avons des nouvelles de Kiki. Je vous avais écrit qu'il avait quitté Londres et qu'il est arrivé depuis sain et sauf à Brazzaville.

Nous recevons de ses nouvelles régulièrement par cable. Combien de temps restera-t-il à Brazzaville je n'en sais rien. Son départ a du être très pénible car il a dû quitter ses cousins qui étaient les compagnons de sa vie et oublier pour le moment son espoir, qui était très sérieux, de venir nous voir ici. Hélasi c'est la plus lourde croix que nous puissions porter. Maintenant sa mère parle d'aller le rejoindre à Brazzaville. Cela m'occasionne de nouveaux soucis car il est très difficile de revenir aux Etats-Unis une fois qu'on en sort et les évènements marchent tollement vite que l'on ne peut tabler sur l'avenir même très proche.

Oui, vous avez plus de chances que nous d'avoir tous les votres autour de vous. Je n'ai pas de conseils à vous donner au sujet de votre fils. Cela ne dépend que de lui et ensuite de vous.

Que puis-je vous dire de bien intéressant? Notre vie se passe bien monotone et sans évènements d'aucune sorte. Nous vivons un peu en reclus. Toutefois j'ai décidé de reprendre ma place dans la vie active et ne pouvant plus perdre mon temps à attendre assis sur un fauteuil que les clients se décident à venir, j'ai résolu de prendre une maison dans la 57e rue où nous pourrons également vivre. Cela représente de gros risques, de grands frais, mais que faire! Je ne puis laisser mourir mon nom qui est très connu et apprécié ici et je dois penser à valoriser ma collection. Vous pouvez vous douter combien les affaires sont difficiles dans un hotel, aussi mal installé que je le suis pour montrer des ceuvres d'art. Naturellement je prendrai un directeur américain qui ne me coûtera pas cher étant donné que sa part sera calculée sur le chiffre d'affaires et je restreindrai les frais autant que possible pour commencer. Ce qui me désole c'est que je ne puis prendre Yvon avec moi car il ne peut m'être utile d'aucune façon et d'aucune manière. Il ne connait personne, ne parle pas anglais et ne possède pas de connaissances assez profondes dans les tableaux modernes. De plus il n'a pas le feu sacré et la manière de faire des affaires ici. J'en suis fort peiné car il pourrait croire que je le laisse tomber et pourtant mes æntiments pour luf sont tout ce qu'il y a de plus fraternels. Vu ma fortune restreinte, je dois examiner d'une façon realiste les choses. Je le lui ai d'ailleurs explique ainsi qu'à son frère. Jacques est transforme. Il a bon espoir; c'est un accrocheur et il ira a ssez loin mais son opinion sur son frère est égale à la mi enne.

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On paye toujours tôt ou tard de ne pastêtre créer une personalité et de ne pas s'être fait connaître universellement, prenant les choses d'ici bas trop à la légère, espérant que le présent continuera toujours. Il n'y a pas d'exemple que dans la vie d'un homme des événements durs ne soient pas arrivés. Il faut être à même de surmonter ces moments là en s'aidant le plus possible de son passé. Madeleine est évidemment très malheureuse; vous la connaissez: elle crêne, se met un masque et ne se plaint de rien mais je suis certain que dans le fonds d'elle même elle n'est pas aussi aveugle qu'elle veut bien en donner l'impression et qu'elle souffre de la situation.

Ma belle-mère est allée rejoindre Jacques au Lac Placid où il a loué une villa. Elle va aussi bien que possible mais elle vieillit très rapidement. Quant à nous, je ne sais ce que nous ferons encore. Comme j'ai acheté une voiture à ma fille il est très probable que nous enverrons cette voiture par chemin de fer aussi loin que possible et nous la rejoindrons par avion et irons en Californie où j'ai une énorme clientèle que je désire visiter ainsi que quantités de gens que je connais là-bas.

Ma santé est tout à fait remise. Mes nerfs s'usent de plus en plus mais néanmoins j'ai toujours cette force de résistance et cette foi que vous connaissez. Je n'abdique et ne renonce jamais, moins maintenant qu'auparavant.

Je ne reçois des nouvelles de France que par mon frère Edmond qui est à Cannes. Je sais que mon frère Léonce et ma soeur sont à Paris. Il paraitrait que j'ai été pillé par les allemands. Ils ont détruit complètement ma bibliothèque artistique et, triste dérision du sort, ils ont transformé mon immeuble en Institut de Recherches pour les Questions Israélites. Mais je ne suis pas dénationalisé; les français n'ont rien à me reprocher. Que sont devenus mes tableaux? je n'en sais rien. Il paraitrait que certains auraient été vendus, que les scelles ont été apposés sur d'autres. Mais d'après ce que ma secrétaire me dit je n'ai pas à me réjouir de la conduite de certaines gens et en particulier de mon personnal. Meis c'est la vie. La rancume des petites gens est terrible. On règlera tout cela plus tard car la guerre est inévitablement perdue pour les nazis malgré qu'elle puisse durer encore très longtemps, et nous reviendrons tous en France pour régler quelques comptes débiteurs.

Je ne comprends pas très bien ce que vous me dites au sujet du dollar. J'ai fait contrôler par la banque ici qui m'a dit que le dollar n'aveit pas bougé depuis six mois sur le marché brézilien. Mais croyez bien que si le dollar se dévalorisait toutes les monnaies seraient obligées de suivre la même pente. Le franc, le mark, la livre et le dollar ne peuvent pas tomber à rien sans entraîner avec eux les autres monnaies étrangères. Les échanges économiques deviendraient impossibles. Une nation et une seule peut voir sa monnaie dévalorisée tant que les autres ne le sont pas, mais une nation seule ne peut pas voir sa monnaie stable lorsque toutes deviennent instables. Mais ceci n'est pas de mon ressort, il est beaucoup plus du vôtre.

Quant à vous, à votre âge, il me semble que vous devriez entreprendre quelque chose et créer tent pour vous que pour votre fils un avenir, un but, des occupations. Je sais qu'il est très facile de conseiller cela

......

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mais ne rien faire serait une ruine s'il n'arrive pas une catastrophe finale et si celle-ci arrivait qu'importe le fait d'avoir fait quelque chose. Je me permets de vous dire cela puisque vous me l'écrivez. Pensez à une affaire qui puisse se développer et ne rentrez pas dans une affaire dans laquelle vous courriez des risques par suite de crédits ou de manque de capitaux suffisants.

Ma fille travaille toujours. Elle s'est créé une vie, une occupation, dont elle est ravie. Elle est très estimée de tous et cala me fait plaisir pour elle. Je remercie Jeannine d'avoir ajouté un mot à votre lettre. Dites-lui et croyes le, que nous pensons à vous deux et que nous aimerions vous avoir ici où tout su moins être tous réunis.

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

Le 17 Novembre 1941

Cher Gaston,

Merci mille fois pour votre gentille lettre. Comme bien vous le pensez la triste mort de ce pauvre Yvon nous a tous vivement affectés et nous en sommes encore complètement démontés. C'est vraiment effroyable de penser qu'un garçon comme lui, qui était l'optimisme même et d'une humeur toujours si charmante ai trouvé une mort si stupide alors qu'il partait en Californie se refaire une situation et créer une maison que ses enfants reprendraient à leur retour. Mais Jacques n'est pas le seul à se faire des reproches car c'est moi qui ai conseillé Yvon de se rendre là-bas, pour son bien naturellement, quoique cela soit son frère qui lui a suggéré d'y aller par la route sans se rappeler qu'il conduisait très mal. C'est vraiment la fatalité car il dépendait d'une seconde que cet accident ne se produise pas. Madeleine, qui avait pour son mari la plus grande admiration et un amour des plus profonds se trouve maintenant complètement désemparée. Elle vit meintenant avec nous à l'Hotel Madison en attendant que nous puissions nous installer dans notre nouvelle demeure au 16 East 57.

D'autre part, j'ai eu à m'occuper d'un tas d'affaires très fatigantes. C'est moi qui ai organiser le Centenaire de Renoir qui a lieu en ce moment chez Duveen et qui remporte un succès sans précédent. Vous en entendres surement parler car c'est la plus velle exposition de cet artiste qui ai jamais été faite et 90 de ses tableaux ornent les murs de chez Duveen et sont un régal pour les visiteurs. En quatre jours nous avons encaissé \$5,000, ce qui est unique dans les annales de New York.

Comme vous le savez, je viens d'ouvrir une galerie à New York. La maison que j'ai prise est fort bien et bien placée. Elle a grand genre et l'installation est simple mais à la manière française et tout le monde est d'avis que c'est très beau.

Je suis bien content d'apprendre que vous travaillez car dens le travail on oublie beaucoup de choses. C'est la sauve-garde des hommes et c'est leur raison de vivre. La séparation que vous devez subir en ce qui concerne votre fils n'est rien à côté de celle que nous avons avec le nôtre. Il ne dépend que de vous de le voir tandis que pour nous cela représente je ne sais combien de kilomètres. Mais on est en train d'expérimenter en ce moment un nouveau service aérien avec l'Afrique et peut-être, un jour prochain, ma femme et moi débarquerons dans vos environs en route pour Brazzaville afin de voir notre fils. C'est un voyage assez hasardeux et long comme

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bien vous le pensez mais nous vivons dans l'espoir de revoir notre enfant qui nous a quitté au mois de Juin 1940.

Ici les affaires sont difficiles quoique je n'ai pas lieu de me plaindre. De son côté Jacques travaille très bien. Il est d'une confiance rare, comme je ne lui en ai jamais connu avant et j'en suis fort heureux pour lui. De France je reçois des nouvelles des uns et des autres, de Gilbert particulièrement. Mais les nouvelles que j'ai ne sont pas très agréables à recevoir. Je n'ai aucune idée de ce que sont devenus mes affaires là-bas. Il règne dans la zone occupée une telle prudence que beaucoup de gens hésitent à m'écrire, même par voies détournées.

Nous avons de bonnes nouvelles de mon fils qui correspond surtout par cables. Il nous écrit très souvent mais ses lettres ne nous parviennent pas toutes, et quand elles arrivent elles mettent trois mois à nous parvenir. Depuis son arrivée nous n'avons reçu que trois lettres qui ne nous disent pas grand chose.

Quant à Michel, je sais qu'il va bien. Il va peut-être être libéré prochainement et il espère venir ici avec sa femme. Gaston Bensimon est ici et il arrive continuellement de nouveaux émigrés français de telle sorte qu'il existe une très grande colonie française.

Je vous remercie de me conseiller de voir votre ami Jacques Coe. Je ne manquerai pas de le faire si j'en ai besoin. Excusez moi de ne pas vous écrire plus longuement, mon cher Gaston, car les multiples détails en ce qui concerne l'organisation de ma nouvelle maison et toutes les autres affaires dont je m'occupe prennent tout mon temps.

Transmettez toutes mes amitiés à Janine et à votre bellemère ainsi qu'à tous vos enfants. Quent à vous, mon cher Gaston, j'espère toujours vous voir arpenter la 5e Avenue ou la 57e rue, et croyez moi votre bien affectueusement,

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NOTES SUR RENOIR

Auguste, Pierre Renoir, né à Limoges le 25 Février 1841, fils d'un tailleur, vint à Paris très jeune. Commença à peindre des stores verts puis fut employé à la Manufacture Nationale de Sèvres où il peignit des sujets se rapportant au XVIIIe siècle. Il quitta la Manufacture pour se lancer dans la peinture.

Naturellement il connut la misère la plus profonde, ne fut pas compris et fut critiqué par tout le monde. Il fut même obligé de vendre des toiles aux enchères à l'Hotel Drouot et ses toiles les meilleures partirent au prix de 80 francs. Une de celles-ci fut acquise par un jeune homme en 1880 et son père le lui reprocha en disant:
"Si tu me rapportes encore des ignominies pareilles, je te coupe les vivres". Ce même tableau fut vendu en 1921 en Amérique pour \$30,000.

Durand-Ruel, Monsieur Albert Wolf, le critique câlèbre de Figaro, écrivit l'article le plus surprenant et le plus effarant qu'il soit, disant:

"La rue Lepelletier (l'Opéra venait de brûler) vient de subir un nouveau malheur. Une bande de fous expose ches Durand-Ruel. Ils prennent une toile et jettent, au hasard du pinceau, de la couleur sur celle-ci, et puis ils signent. Dites à Monsieur Renoira, s'exclame-t-il, aque les femmes ne sont pas en décompositiona. Et il termine son article en disent:

"En sortant de cette exposition un homme mordait dans la rue les passanta.

Un collectionneur de cette époque laissa à sa mort, vers 1895, sa collection à l'Etat Français. Après bien des discussions et maints pourparlers la moitié fut acceptée mais fut reléguée dans une petite

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selle impossible à trouver dans le Musée du Luxenbourg tandis que les oeuvres de tous les pontifes officiels étaient précieusement étalées dans les autres salles de ce musée. Juste retour des choses, aujourd'hui cette collection a été transportée au Musée du Louvre dont elle en est la page la plus glorieuse de l'Art Français et attire tous les visiteurs du monde entier.

Renoir représent la plus grande liberté en art. Celui-ci lui permit de reproduire les sujets les plus variés de son époque, depuis des portraits et figures de femmes jusqu'à des scènes de la vie de Montmartre et des nus avec une aristocracie sans pareille. Il eut une influence énorme sur la peinture. Partout dans le monde, dans tous les musées, même en Allemagne qui était à cette époque un pays libre, se trouvent des oeuvres de cet artiste. Dans toutes les collections privées on trouve des exemplaires de ce peintre et ses toiles qui, à 1º époque 1876-1885, furent dédaignées, méprisées, se vendent aujourd'hui pour des sommes allant jusqu'à \$150,000. Il fut vraiment le peintre de la femme et le peintre le plus français qu'il soit. Ses tableaux les plus célèbres sont:- "Le Déjeuner des Canotiers"; "Le Bal du Moulin de la Galette"; "Danse à la Ville" et "Danse à la Campagne"; portrait de "Jeanne Samari", etc. (tous ces tableaux figurent dans la présente exposition). "La Famille Charpentier", une des plus belles toiles du Metropolitan & New York.

Vers 1900 il fut atteint de rhumatismes qui contractèrent ses mains et qui firent de sa pauvre personnalité une loque humaine, mais, disait-il:- "Je puise ma foi dans la peinture et je peints pour m'amuser et pour me distraire". On était obligé de lui lier les pinceaux par des bendelettes afin qu'il puisse continuer à peindre et on le transpor-

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tait dans un fauteuil roulant vers son chevalet. On lui reprochait, à cette époque, qui est peut-être la plus glorieuse de son existence, cette infirmité qui, aux yeux de tous ceux qui croient que l'art consiste dans l'habileté à manier un pinceau, le rendait soi-disant incapable. C'était pourtant à ce soment qu'il se rajeunissait de plus en plus, que ses toiles prenaient de plus en plus de couleur et de soleil, qu'il créait les admirables vues de la Provence et de la France et la douceur d'y vivres- des fleurs, des fruits, des scènes de maternité, des femmes, des nus, oeuvres qui aujourd'hui sont considérées aussi belles que celles de n'importe quel peintre, de n'importe quel temps et de n'importe quel pays.

Mais il ne tenait nullement aux honneurs et cette distinction lui suffisait pour montrer qu'il n'était pas le premier venu. Ce peintre fut un des plus grands artistes de la France. Son oeuvre est immense et se propagera dans le temps. Il a influencé toute la peinture moderne. Cézamne et Renoir ont le plus contribué par leurs oeuvres à la gloire de l'Art Français. Ils sont à eux deux les plus beaux maillons de la chaine ininterrompue de l'Art Français depuis les Carolingiens jusqu'à nos jours. Tout en continuant la tradition de l'Art en France, ils sont les plus typiques représentants de l'Art Français de la Troisième République, qui compte en outre une quantité de génies, unique dans le monde entier.

Si, en 1870, la phalange appelée "impressionistes" avait existée ou si elle existait aujourd'hui, elle serait, de la part de nos ennemis et par les français opposés à la République, appelée "art déjénéré".

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L'Art Français, au cours du XIIe siècle, domine à cette époque, et aucun pays quelqu'il soit n'a jamais pu rivaliser avec nos artistes.

Remoir fut un peintre libre et il appartient aux français d'Amérique de glorifier cet illustre compatriete puisque la mère patrie n'est pas à même de le faire. C'est un grand honneur pour eux que cette exposition soit organisée au profit du Free French Relief dans la libre Amérique. Il faut comparer son art à la politique, exalter la liberté en art, qui, comme dans tous les autres domaines, est essentiellement nécessaire pour créer, vivre, croire.

Rien chez Renoir n'est académique. Il ranène la peinture à sa vraie destination et vers son seul buts- faire des oeuvres d'art. Il affranchit la peinture de cet aspect académique, sans ême et où seul la semblant de fini pouvait faire croire à une oeuvre réalisée artistiquement. "Le fini", disait Beaudelaire, "n'est pas toujours beau mais le beau est toujours fait." Ceci vout dire ue Renoir travaillait ses oeuvres et les menaient à bien sans y ajouter des accessoires ou des choses complètement inutiles et étrangères à une oeuvre d'art. Son nom passera à la postérité, son influence grandira de plus en plus et contribuera au rayonnement de l'Art Français dans le monde.

Nous remercions tous les généreux prêteurs, les musées de cette grande Amérique, qui ouvre ses portés aux plus illustres enfants des autres pays, où règne cette liberté de croire, de penser et d'agir. Hous remercions les personnalités américaines qui ont élevées de nouveau, un monument à cet artiste qui permet ainsi de rappeler au monde que Remoir est le peintre qui représente le mieux le vrai visage de la doulce France et de son passé aujourd'hui tellement défigurés.

I would be only too glad to secure you a policy only I think that under the circumstances it would be much better for you to subscribe to one in your own home state as in New York the condition and type of your premises are not known.

I deeply regret for you that you do not add the Monet to your collection. The price of this painting may seem a little high to some people but you must realize that it is a masterpiece and it would be impossible to find its equivalent. This explains why it is higher than other paintings by the same master. Several others have been proposed to you for much less but you rejected them because you could easily judge the difference in the artistic value.
