Dear Mr. Rosenberg,

I was so glad to hear at long last from you and to see that you are well and actively successful again.

I have been contemplating writing to you for a long time because, as you know, things over here in regard to Modern Pictures are much more active than anywhere else, in fact prices, from all I hear about your market, are well above the U.S.A. level. This, of course, is due to the extreme shortage of Impressionist Pictures.

I am wondering if any of your pictures are still in this country. In this case I would like to suggest that my firm should either buy outright from you or sell at a fixed percentage such pictures as you are prepared to realize. If you want to re-invest the money, there may be from time to time possibilities, particularly with first rate Old Masters, which, compared with Modern Pictures, are even cheaper than before, and have hardly increased their value at all compared with the depressed conditions prevailing before the war. I wish you would give this suggestion serious consideration, and I am hoping that it will lead to some further developments.

My dear Mr. Rosenberg:

I shall, of course, bring to the Committee on the Museum your request for the loan of the two paintings by Degas which you request. I know, however, that regretfully the Committee will refuse to make the loan, and I am writing you immediately to let you know that you should not count on the pictures. The point is that both pictures are on a list of paintings which are not to be loaned under any circumstances from the Museum. To be sure, they have been loaned in the past, but subsequently, it was voted that they should not be. Considering the worthiness of the cause in which we are all so deeply interested, the Committee might possibly reconsider were it not for the fact that these two pictures have been sent away from the Museum with others of the most precious of things, and placed in a remote hideout where they are not to be disturbed for the duration of the war. Granted this, plus the fact of the list, makes me certain that the Committee would not lend, and, indeed, I could not recommend it, nor could Mr. Constable. Without our recommendations, the Committee certainly would not vote the loan. I know you will realize how deeply I regret this not only because I believe naturally in supporting the Red Cross, but I know that any exhibition gathered by you will be distinguished, and the paintings meticulously handled.





Dear Mr. McIlhenny,

Last time I saw you I forgot to speak to you about a certain matter which touches me very deeply and which I will proceed to expose.

One month after I left France a law was passed stating that everyone who left France between the 10th of May up to the 30th of June, may loose their citizenship and, as a consequence, have all their property confiscated unless they could produce proofs of a valid reason for leaving the country.

As yet, this law has not been applied to me but my brother, who is keeping me informed on the subject, has cabled me lately asking me to send him letters from the directors of Museums in America in which they request me to come to this country and give lectures as well as organize exhibitions in their institutes.

It is my belief that all my assets in France stand in ery great danger. They are coveted by man people who are anxious to get hold of them as they are short of works of art and would like to make an easy profit by disposing of them or selling them to the Germans.

If I were able to avoid this confiscation I could then bring my possessions over here and thus enribh the country.

Would it be too much to ask from your friendship to send me a letter stating that in February 1940 you asked me, by letter, to come to the United States for the above mentioned purpose? If any emergency should arise this letter would in all probability prevent the measure from being applied to me as there has already been a precedent for someone who was in he same situation and jo steps were taken against him.

In the terrible times we are going through I would indeed be thankful to you if you could do this for me and thus help avoid the Germans from taking away from me my most marvelous collection. Please think the matter over and let me know what you think of it.



My dear Walter,

I have received some very bad news from France. Before going into detail I must tell you that a law has been passed over there stating that all those who have left France between the 10th of May up to the 30th of June, may loose their citizenship and, as a consequence, have all their property confiscated. That law was passed one month after I left France; however, it is still in force.

One of my brothers, who resides in the South of France, has written to inform me that in view of the very important assets I possess over there there is the greatest of possibilities that this law be applied to me. There are quite a few people who would be interested in setting hold of what I have either to sell to the Germans or to make profits on it. In order to help counteract this measure my brother advises me to send written proofs that I was requested to come to the United States by the Directors of Museums in this country and give lectures in their institutes.

That is why I am taking the liberty to ask if it would be possible for you to send me a letter stating that in April 1940 you asked me to come over to the United States and give lectures in your institute. This would indeed be a great help to me and might avoid confiscation of all the assets which I then could bring over here.

I am awfully sorry to trouble you with this matter and it is only our great friendship which has prompted me to make such a request.



I am in receipt of your letter of June 19th, and your letter of later date, which I am unable to find at the moment, referring to Mr. Picher's visit to you.

I have also received both envelopes of photographs which you forwarded under separate cover.

I was most interested in receiving the photographs and price lists on the Picasso and Braque paintings. I will be perfectly frank in saying that I had no idea that the prices on the Braques, particularly, would be so high. I realize I should have told Mr. Picher what I was prepared to spend before asking him to call on you.

I have been anxious to have one of the larger Braques for a long time, as I have a perfect place to hang it, and I feel that nothing would be so suitable for the place as a Braque. The room has green chartreuse walls with furniture mostly by Malmsen of Stockholm and the rug has "Braque" colors and was designed and made by Mybo. Consequently, I would rather not hang anything in the room unless it were a Braque, as a Braque, with its browns and chartreuse colors would be perfect.

I hope to be in New York some time this summer, and I will most certainlyget in touch with you when I get to New York.

For your information, I am prepared to spend about \$2500 for a Braque. I had figured that I could get a good Braque at this price because in Paris in 1934 there were some excellent Braques for sale at that figure. For that reason, I had no idea that they had gone up so much in price since then, and consequently, I asked Mr. Picher to make inquiry for me when he was in New York.
