Dear Mr. Rosenberg:



His only lawful right is to grant authorization for each reproduction and to each individual who wishes to reproduce one of his pictures.

Having always been Picaser's representative, it does not however belong to us to grant, on the assumption that I am the present owner, the right to reproduce this painting. I would not want Picasso, who is as you know so close to me and with whom I have been associated for over thirty years, to repreach me for not having defended his rights.

As I already told you in my last letter, personally, as the owner, I have no objection chatsoover end, if perchance, you have already had such transactions with the artist, please ignore no completely and act according to that you think best in this matter.

Since receiving your kind letter of December ninth regarding the possibility of our making a color reproduction of Picasso's MThe Three Musicians," we have been looking into the matter of French and U.S. reproduction rights and find that the law, as regards rights in this country, is that they belong to the owner of the work of art unless they have been specifically withheld by the artist at the time of sale. We realize, of course, that according to French law the reproduction rights belong to the artist. But we know from our own experience that Picasso has always been most generous and cooperative in the matter of permitting reproduction of his works. You, of course, know Picasso far better than we do, and it would be better to have your decision as to whether he would like to have this celebrated painting reproduced. Judging from our own past relations with Picasso, we have every reason to believe that he would readily consent to having such a reproduction made.

If you also agree that this would be the case, there would seem to be no reason why this reproduction should not be made. It would certainly be most welcome to hundreds of teachers and students of Picasso's work in this country. If you do decide to permit us to make the reproduction, we shall be most happy to submit the color proofs for your approval.

Dear Mr. Rosenberg:

Here are photographs and a monograph on the Argentine Cubist painter, Emilio Pettoruti, about whom I spoke to you this morning. I myself have not seen more than two or three of his pictures. I thought them quite good in color. He has brought to this country enough paintings so that those which were obviously dependent on Gris might be eliminated.

Since I can give you no really definite information I am quoting from a recent letter from Dr. Morley of the San Francisco Museum, where a large exhibition of his paintings is now on view.

The exhibition is on the walls - to the number of forty oils that braved the submarines and came through successfully. He has also some drawings and small paintings with him which I have not yet seen. It is a quite magnificent exhibition, for the things are large, handsome in design and color and sustained so the impression of quality is strong. There are plenty of echoes of what has appeared also in the works of the men whom Pettoruti considers he accompanies and whose work is more familiar to us, but when you really look there is a strong personal contribution that isn't like anything I know elsewhere. The color is handled in masterly fashion, and there seems to me a very interesting and individual understanding and handling of volume and space. He knows what he is doing - no fumbling anywhere, and the results are very impressive. I do know that he is miles ahead of anyone else working in abstraction in Latin American countries, and from the point of view of sure mastery and competence in technique and expression he stands among the three or four of greatest value in all South America. But it is an international art, with little, except perhaps temperament and color, that is at all local.

"As a man you will enjoy him, I think. Dear Mr. Rosenberg:

I have consulted with our Committee about the proposal in your letter of May 12th. The Committee feels that both the Degas pastel and the "Femme Sculpteur" are worth well over \$4000. If you could allow us \$5000 on the Degas I am sure I can get the Committee to agree immediately. This would be half way between your original estimate of \$6000 and your present estimate of \$4000. I may say that within the past year we have asked two other dealers what they thought the Museum should get for the Degas if we put it on the market through them. One said \$6000, another \$10,000. You yourself, last Fall, when I showed you the picture here in the Museum, said \$6000 unless I am mistaken.

I have to leave town in a few minutes, but will be back on Wednesday of next week.

Meanwhile let me confirm that in any case we want to get the Picasso. It is the Leger that is difficult, for my Committee is not enthusiastic about it.

Dear Mr. Barr,

I have looked in the Degas sale for the pastel which was given to you by Mr. Paley (No.204 of the first Degas sale at the Galerie Georges Petit, 6-7 May 1918). This picture was included in the first sale and brought 417,600 plus 10%. At that time the franc was nearly all gold and could be counted as five francs to the dollar.

Thank you for sending "The Nude" by Degas for my inspection. I am sorry to say that I overestimated the picture by the photograph. Although it is of a fine quality one must not forget that it is a mude seen from the back which makes the sale more difficult. Therefore, I am obliged to come back on my estimation and rate it at \$4,000 and give you the choice of:- \$7,000 in cash and either the pastel by Degas or "La Femme Scuapteur" by Picasso.

Please believe I am not trying to create any difficulties. You know the small profit I make on these two pictures. I do it with the best of intentions in order to facilitate your purchase of the two paintings.

Dear Mr. Rosenberg:

The Museum of Modern Art announces that from May 6 to 28 it will exhibit a large number of works of art to be sold at fixed prices for the benefit of its Armed Services Division. On the evening of May 28, all unsold items will be auctioned at the Museum. The major portion of the funds raised through the sale and auction will be turned over to the Soldier Art Program under the direction of the U. S. Army's Special Services Branch.

I am now writing to ask you to contribute to this sale a work or works of art. Included in the sale will be paintings, sculpture, water colors, gouaches, drawings, lithographs, etchings and prints. The exhibition space at our disposal is limited, and we hope to keep the level of quality as high as possible. For these reasons, the Museum must reserve the right to decide which works offered will fit into the general scheme of the sale. The sole criterion upon which it will base its judgment is that the work offered be good of its kind, and that if it is an oil painting, its minimum value be roughly \$100, though many works of far greater value are expected. (Works in other media worth less than this will be gladly accepted.) It should be emphasized that the sale and exhibition are in no way limited to modern works of art.

The U. S. Army's Soldier Art Program, to which most of the funds will be given, will provide facilities and materials for soldier-artists. The Museum is making its contribution to this Program with the approval of the War Department, but completely on its own initiative. Our purpose in so doing is to further the function of art as part of the military war effort, a function acknowledged and exploited to the hilt by our enemies.

The remainder of the funds raised by the Art Sale will be used for the general purposes of the Armed Services Program, including special entertainment programs to be held in the Museum for members of the Armed Services, an exhibition and publication of therapeutic designs for convalescent soldiers and sailors, and the distribution of art books and reproductions to Army camps.

As an old friend of the Museum, won't you send us, on behalf of your firm, a list of works of art which you would be willing to give to the Art Sale? I would very much appreciate your generosity in doing so.

I certainly would not like you to think that I have raised the price of "La Galette" by Picasso. I was quite surprised myself to learn that Mr. Kenn had asked \$5,000 for it in 1939. The last time I saw him in Paris and that was in April 1940, he wanted \$8,000. This will explain may I was asking \$9,000 since I am entitled to \$1,000 commission. I gave you a copy of the cable I received from my secretary in London by which you saw for yourself that Mr. Kenn was asking \$6,400. I do not know if he intends to deduct the amount he received for the damage incurred by his painting or not.

Therefore, this letter is to put in black and white the exact situation so that I can show you that I am quite innocent in the variation of the prices. I cabled yesterday to Mr. Kenn the following:-

"YOU ASKED DECEMBER NINETEENTHIRTYNINE MODERN ART MUSEUM
"FIVETHOUSAND FOR PICASSO ON WHICH YOU RECEIVED
"SIXHUNDREDFORTY DAMAGES WHICH IS LOWEST PRICE"

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of February 2nd in connection with the Picasso "Still Life with a Dog", 1921.

I am terribly sorry to let you know that your proposal does not not even allow me a profit of 10% as I paid \$3,800 for it sixteen months ago. If you add the interest you will easily realize that I cannot sell such an important picture with only a 10% profit. In asking 20% more I thought I was being very reasonable as you know that this painting is worth a lot more than that. I have sold, quite recently, a fifteen size canvas of \$32 which is much harder to understand, for \$2,500. Bearing this in mind I believe that at \$4,560 it would be a very inexpensive acquisition for the Museum and to show you my good will and how I am always ready to meet you I will make it a round figure of \$4,500.
