Thanks for your kind letter of December 25th.

I am communicating your letter to Mr. Georges Duthmit who will reply in person and send you the information requested. May I call your attention to specify to Mr. Duthmit approximately how long his speech should last. I had the pleasure to speak to Mr. Hoppenot last night during his brief stay in New York, and I called his attention to the important manifestation of French Art which you are organizing in your institute. From my conversation with him I gathered that he would reply favourably to an invitation sent by you, should you think his presence at the opening would add to the importance of the show. Mr. Hoppenot also premised me he would do his utmost to let you have the Lautrec, "Portrait de Henri Samary", belonging to the Laroche Collection. He had not answered you yet on this subject because he ignored where the painting was and who was Mr. Laroche. I explained everything to him and I have good reason to believe you will be able to count it amongst your loans. Dear Mr. Weddell,

I have great pleasure in informing you that Mr. Georges Duthuit has kindly accepted to be your speaker at the opening of your exhibition which takes place on the 18th of January.

Mr. Duthuit, besides being the son in law of Henri Matisse, was attached, in France, to the Mational Museums and has been an ardent Fighting Frenchman from the very beginning and is consequently acquainted with everything concerning the cause. He has consented not to receive any honorarium excepting the reimbursement of his travaling expenses. I can assure you that all the Fighting French are glad that a man of his qualification will have the honor of speaking on behalf of the true figure of France and French art. His address is: 209 East 52nd Street, New York, N.Y.

Those you had mentioned proviously are not at all qualified. The man is in Algiers and the other party does not fulfill the conditions required to speak on French art as she as taken upon several occasions a stand not at all in keeping with the ideals we pursue which is most regretable. I am very pleased to learn through your letter of the 14th inst. that you have been able to secure from Mrs. Rogers the loan of a Monet, a Manet, a Pissarro, a Degas and a Van Gogh. Although it has taken time to build up your show I think you have managed very well and I am sure the results will be most successful. When you receive a reply from Mr. Hoppenot - and I think it will be in the affirmative - you will have a very fine exhibition indeed.

As far as Mrs. Rogers is concerned, if you give me the exact titles of the pictures she is lending you I may be able to give you all the biography you need about them. I am afraid that if you insist either in writing to Mrs. Rogers or Miss Tulp you might spoil her generous loan and anyway I do not think she would go to all the trouble of looking up the data in her files.

If you are planning to have a speaker for the Preview who is connected with the cause of Free France, may I suggest you get in touch with France Forever, 587 Fifth Avenue, the only Fighting French organization recognized by the Committee of National Liberation, or you may apply directly to the Delegation itself. Thank you very much for your kind letter of December 19th. I appreciate very much your letting us have the four paintings you mentioned and the data which you enclosed. In the same mail which brought your letter, I received a letter from Miss Tulp, Secretary to Mrs. Rogers, in which she tells me that Mrs. Rogers said she thought she could lend us a Monet, a Manet, a Pisarro, a Degas, a Van Gogh and two Boudins. I have written and thanked her, saying, however, that I am not including Boudin in the exhibition but that I should like to have the others which she mentioned.

Mrs. Rogers has also stated that she wishes any pictures which she lends to the exhibition to be regarded as an anonymous loan. Of course, I shall have to comply with this although I regret very much that her name cannot be added to the contributors since I think it would be excellent for Virginians to know that they have a collector of these fine paintings in the State.

Miss Tulp tells me that I shall have to secure exact information on the pictures for the catalog from Mrs. Rogers. Since my time is limited for getting the catalog to the printer in order to have it completed for the Preview, I am hoping that I can secure the necessary information from Mrs. Rogers in time.

I have also written to Mr. M.H. Hoppenot today, telling him that you have told me about the painting belonging to Mr. Laroche, by Lautrec, representing the actor Henri Samary, and asking him if we may have it for the exhibition. I quoted from the Foreword in my catalog about our debt to French culture and the sympathy which we have for its rehabilitation. We are planning to have a speaker here for the Preview who is connected with the cause of Free France, hoping that this will stress the purpose of our exhibition.

I am very glad to hear that the City Art Museum of St Louis has granted your request for "Le Liseur" by Manet as well as the others you mention. At the present time it is very difficult to obtain loans either from private sources or from dealers because the latter find it practically impossible to replace what they sell and are not envious to part, even momentarily, with what they have. However, I shall most certainly lend you "Marguerite de Conflans" by Manet; "The Windmill at Etretat" by Corot, a painting by Braque and one by Picasso. I am sending you enclosed on a separate sheet all the data on these pictures so that you may use it for your catalogue.

I am sorry to hear you got no reply from Mrs. Rogers. You might try to get in touch with Miss Tulp who takes care of all her business here in New York. Her address and telephone number are as follows:- Miss Ellen Tulp, 152 East 56th St. New York, N.I. Tal. ELdorado 5-0345. I am sure she will do everything possible to help you and you will find her quite cooperative.

As regards paintings by Claude Monet, Burand-Ruel is the one who has the nost and I believe they will be only too glad to lend you one. As for Toulouse-Lautree, that is another question. You might ask the Reverend Theodore Pitcairn of Bryn Athen, Pa. or Mrs. W. Averill Harriman, or The Art Institute of Chicago. You could also try and get one belonging to a French collector whose paintings are frozen here in America and under the control of the Fighting French Delegation in Washington; you might address your request to Mr. M.M. Hopponot, Ministre Planipotentiaire, Délégué du Comité Français de la Libération Nationale, 1224 16th Street N.W., Washington, D.C., who, I feel sure, will help you all he can. They have, belonging to M. Laroche in France, a most splandid Lautrec representing the actor Houri Sameri. Since the picture is in Washington and not very far from you it will save you a let of expenses and trouble. I think that if you mention that Mr. Paul

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Rosenberg told you that "such a picture was amongst the French pictures", Mr. Hoppenet who knows me very wall will hand the matter over to Mr. Battigme who is in charge of those pictures. The two Degas which I have as very small and, although the Renoir lent by Durand-Ruel and the Gauguin lent by Mr. Wildenstein are both very interesting examples of these artists for people who are acquainted with their work, I feel that neither of them is quite what I should like to have for this special exhibition.

When I was in New York, you told me that you would let me have the following paintings: ""Mme. de Conflans" by Manet, "The Windmill at Etretat" by Corot, a painting by Braque and one by Picasso. I am very anxious to have all of these, especially the first two. Will you please send me data on the paintings you will send me that I can use for the catalog?

Although I have written and telegraphed Mrs. Rogers, I have received no more word from her except the one telegram, a sking about transporta-tion and insurance. I have just about given up hope of getting her things, which I regret very much since they would add so much to the exhibition. I really do not know what more I can do in regard to urging her to commit herself either one way or the other.

I am enclosing a copy of a list of paintings which I am THE STRAKER OF THE HOUSE OF DEPARTMENT OF THE HOUSE OF fairly certain to get for my exhibition. Then there would be another small gallery of drawings.

I heard from Mrs. Rogers today. She did not say definitely that she will lend me any paintings but I am rather inclined to believe that she will. After seeing you in New York, I called on Miss Tulp and had an extremely pleasant visit with her. She promised to help me in every way she could in regard to the paintings.

I shall appreciate very much having any suggestions which you might give me in regard to the exhibition and the list which I am submitting to I know that you are extremely busy and feel guilty in taking your time but I am so anxious to have a good French exhibition here in the South, where these masters are so little known.

Je ne sais ce qu'il fait, comment il va. Ses lettres sont rares. Vous m'obligeriez beaucoup, si vous le voyez, de me dire franchement ce que vous penses. Quel est son état d'esprit, s'il ne s'ennuie pas trop, comme doivent s'ennuyer vous et les autres.

Plein d'espoir, j'ai ouvert une galerie à New York au plus mauvais moment de l'histoire. J'ai loué toute une maison dans la 57ème entre Fifth et Madison, une des plus belles situations de New York et nous habitons là également. Les affaires sont bien mauvaises. Les américains sont tellement taxés qu'il ne leur reste plus d'argent pour acheter des objets d'art. Mais cela n'a pas d'importance.
