My dear Mr. Rosenberg:

Many thanks for your kind letter of August 27. About your beautiful Van Gogh painting, "The Rain" - I wonder if you would allow me to write to the Director of the museum which is considering the purchase of this painting as per the enclosed letter. When we had our Mary Cassatt exhibition last year, we wanted to include an early painting by her which the Omaha Museum had under consideration. Kelekian, who owned the picture, allowed me to write telling them how important we considered the picture and how we needed it for our show, and it turned the trick. We showed the painting and then Omaha bought it.

This is just a suggestion. You know how much we should like to have the picture included. It may be that our wanting the picture so much will heighten their appreciation of it.

Mr. Fox, who is preparing our catalog for the show, has asked me to pass on several questions to which he hopes that you may have the answers. Mr. Maurice Wertheim's picture "La Berceuse" is listed as de la Faille 506. But this is the number of the Birch-Bartlett "Berceuse" in Detroit. Therefore he thinks that Mr. Wertheim's must be No. 508, which was formerly in your collection. Further, is Miss Hudson's "Les Paveurs" No. 657, which was formerly in your collection, or No. 658, which was bought by Mr. Wildenstein? And is not her "Meadow at Auvers" really "Vue a'Auvers", No. 762? Finally, is not the "Paysage a St.-Remy", loaned by Mr. Thannhauser, the landscape in your fine exhibition which was listed as being loaned by Eleanora and Francesco von Mendelssohn (de la Faille 641)? Mr. Thannhauser's other picture we take to be "Le Pont sur la Seine" No. 240. Is this correct?

We should greatly appreciate your checking these for us, as our catalog must go to print, and although these pictures have been assured us for the exhibition, so far we have received no data on them.

I think that there is a good chance that the Princess Juliana may appear for our opening, which will in itself insure us a tremendous success for that event. I shall let you know when we hear definitely.

Besides, I am very much afraid that this museum, which has the reputation of never lending any pictures, might not even answer your request or even take this opportunity of amouncing the purchase of "The Rain" which they have had under consideration since the 28th of May.

What I propose is for you to include the picture in your show and in the meantime I may get a favorable reply. I will then immediately send it to you.

Concerning Mr. Wertheim's picture I do not know of any painting by Van Gogh belonging to him bearing the title "La Berceuse". Miss Hudson's "Les Paveurs" is No.657. "Vue d'Auvers", No.762, never belonged to Miss Hudson. I sold this picture myself in Paris where it has remained. The "Paysage & St. Rémy" owned by Mr. Thanhauser, is not the one listed in my catalogue washinges loaned by Glampa and Francesco von Mendelssohn. 

1 Picasso, watercolor "Flower Vendor" 1 Daumier, portrait of "Charles Debereau" 1 Daumier, "Sancha Panza"

Regarding the last two pictures mentioned above, which Mr. David Rosen has had under examination. I have not heard anything from Mr. Rosen, and I am wondering if he has had a personal talk with you regarding them. I understand your position in the matter, and I assure you that this whole investigation is strictly confidential. For that reason, I am typing this letter myself.

I will deeply appreciate your further advise on what to do next, after I have heard from Mr. Rosen. If you like, you can write to me in pencil, not signing your name to any correspondence on this subject. In that way you can be more assured of not in anyway getting mixed up with my troubles.

I called Sam Salz on the telephone last Friday, and after the usual felicitations, I told him that the little Daumier "Sancha Panza" I bought from him sometime ago for \$4,500, was a pretty picture but was too small to hang with

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my other paintings. I asked him if he had a larger Daumier that he could make a trade on, and he said that he did not have any Daumier at all in his collection at the present time. I then said I would like to have him send me the Pissamo that he showed me in New york November 15th, describing the picture which is dated 1872 or '77. The subjectlandscape, "House by the Side of the Road." A fine sunlit picture which he priced at \$5,000. He then said to me "Stanley, good pictures are very hard to get now, and on account of people buying them for investment, they have ready sale." I then said, "You have a larger Pissarro, title, "Garden of the Touleries" (The Louvre in the background). This picture he had priced to me at \$7,000. I then said, "Please send these two Pissarros out to me by express, and I will promise to see that you get them back the day after their arrival if they are not purchased. He said, "I will get them off by express for you tomorrow." This was last Saturday.

Now I have just received a letter from Sam Salz by Air-Mail, Special Delivery, in which he said, "I have deceided I cannot express you these two pissarro paintings because I would first have to know that if you purchased either of them it would have to be a cash deal, as I could not accept any pictures in trade because paintings of my taste are not possible to get now." Therefore, he would like to hear from me before sending the pictures to California.

My object in having these two paintings sent here was to select one of them, preferably Pissarros, "The Garden of the Touleries", which was the \$7,000 picture, then offer to trade him the Daumier "Sancha Panza" in on it, paying him by check the difference, which would be \$2,500.

During our telephone conversation, he did not mention the Daumier again, and seemed to me to be stearing clear of it. I am now wondering if he has in anyway suspicioned I am having the picture investigated, and being cagey, has told me that he would express me these two pictures, and after considering it further, has deceided not to let either one of them out of his hands. If you were in my position, not having any proof yet from Mr. Rosen, what would you do next?

Any help or advise you can give me from your past knowledge of how such matters can best be handled will be very greatfully appreciated by me.

I have not heard from you for a very, very long time and I am very anxious to know how you are. I know that you have not been very well but I am deprived of your news and I regret it. Where are the good old days when you and I discussed about art?

Here we are very sad because we shall no longer be able to receive news of our boy and we don't know where he is. His mother and I are very depressed to be deprived of hearing from him and everybody will understand that.

I really think the war is going very well and that in the near future victory will be ours and everything once more like it used to be.

Over here I am deprived of one of my greatest pleasures which is to buy great paintings. They are terribly scarce. There are buyers but no sellers. The only great picture I have bought recently is a most stupendous Degas about the same period as your "Laundress", representing four dancers painted in a very broad manner and reaching an expression of art never attained before. The picture without the frame measures seven feet long by thrity six inches high. How pleased I would be to be able to show it to you as I know how much you would enjoy seeing it. How well do I recall the pleasure of discussing art with a lady like you who loves and understands art so well.

I know that I am very protontious, but may I ask you to drop me a line if you are well enough to do so. I can assure you it would do me a lot of good.

Please extend my best remembrances to Mr. Beatty and balieve me, as usual,




