I wish to confirm by letter my telegram to you of this day as follows:-

AS MUCH AS I APPRICIATE YOUR OFFER OF \$1600 FOR HARTLEY PAINTING CANNOT ACCEPT LOWER FIGURE AND FACE DISCONTENTMENT FROM HEIRS WHO WILL HAVE RIGHT TO CONTEND I AM UNDERATING VALUE OF PICTURES STOP REGRET VERY MUCH AS WOULD HAVE DOME AS YOU SUGGEST WITHOUT HESITATION OF MY OWN INITIATIVE

I am really very sorry that nothing more can be done about this matter as you know how much I would like to see Hartley represented in your institute by one of his great paintings. However, I think you will easily understand that in regard to the heirs, if I were to accept your proposition, they would have a right to think and tell me that I was not acting in the interest of Hartley and that instead of building him up as he should be, I would only be understing the value of his works. As I said in the telegram, if it were not for this I would have acted as you suggest long ago.

Dear Mr. O'Connor,

At your request, please find enclosed the invoice for Max Weber's painting, "The Quartet".

I am glad you appreciate my efforts and now I can tell you that upon receipt of your offer of \$1,400.00, I telephoned Max to come to New York so that I may discuss with him the possibility of a purchase of one of his pictures. When he learned of your offer he was very disappointed and it was while he was in the gallery that the telegram of refusal was sent to you. However, the nex day I decided to take the matter into my own hands and knowing that Max would not waver in his decision the only course to take was to reduce my own commission of \$200.00. I do not want Max to know of this. I wish him to believe the Institute acquired his painting at the price set by him.

As for Hartley there is nothing I can do. It is always possible to reason with the living or at least to take responsibilities on their behalf but when the artist is dead it is an entirely different matter. If I were to reduce the price on his pictures, the heirs - who know nothing of the art field and the manner in which business is transacted - would ask me what right have I to underate the value of the artist's canvasses and endanger their financial rights. On the other hand it would be creating a precedent and would place me in the same difficult position with the next prospective buyer. I may add that the Detroit Museum is contemplating buying a Marsden Hartley and I have already explained the situation to Dr. Valentiner and advised him of the fact that his museum is not to expect the slightest reduction from the price quoted and which he has perfectly well understood.

I am very glad that Max Weber will be represented in your permanent collection and trusting you will understand my position towards Hartley, believe me,

Dear Mr. O'Connor,

It is the first time in my long artistic career that I have received a lotter from a Museum director - after having been in such close collaboration with this museum for over 25 years - talling me of his great displeasure in a matter over which I have no control.

I think that if you had given a little thought to this question you would have refrained from writing such a letter.

As surprising as it may seem to you, I am not acquainted with all the heirs and next of kin of Marsden Hartley. The artist left no will and neither has an executor to the estate been named as yet. I think I already told you all this. "The honor and glory of the house of Rosenberg" as you say in your own words, should not be questioned.

If Hartley - who during his lifetime would have felt very honored to be represented by one of his works in the Carnegie Institute were still living, I am sure that your offer would have been accepted by him.

Since the death of the artist I have had the visit of one nephew and one nicca - out of the nine prospective heirs - and these two have asked no to raise the prices on the pictures, which I refused to do inasauch as my first preoccupation is to help build up and support the figure of a very great American painter and that it is my firm intention to stick to the prices set up by the artist in his contract with me.

Therefore, in not raising the prices which - in view of the great desand from both private collectors and suscess - I could be entitled to do, you should realize you are already benefitting by my resolution.

I do not believe that in any way am I trying to evade my responsibility towards the Hartley Estate. The Hartley Estate is in no need for money and at the time the estate is settled, Hartley's works will have increased in such proportion as to make it quite easy to pay the estate taxes.

I have no objection whatsoever for your going over my head to the Marsden Hartley heirs and if you can manage to contact them all and discuss the matter with them, please feel quite free to do

Regarding Weber, I wrote you a letter by which you will see that when I possibly can I do my utmost to give you "a little cooperation". If you wish to correspond directly with him about his picture, I have also no objection. You will soon find out how difficult it is to handle great artists.

To finish this long letter, too long for my taste, I want you to know that I am the last man in the art field to whom such reproaches should be made. All my life has been one of faithfulness towards the painters and towards museums all over theworld.

My latest cooperation was with the following museums of Helsinki (Finland), Stockholm, Oslo, Copenhagen, Amsterdam, Brussels, Zurich, Prague, Belgrade, to whom I not only lent over 150 paintings but bore at the same time all the expenses of transportation, insurance, etc. I do not speak of all the important loans made by me since my arrival to this country to all the great museums and small institutions in remote towns of the United States.

Dear Mr. Rosenberg:

Thanks for your telegram of December 7 as follows:

"Confirm previous telegram. Unable to reduce price Marsden Hartley. Am not acquainted with heirs, therefore cannot do anything. Stop. Price offered for Weber so below market value that it is useless contacting artist. Stop. Very sorry, as these two pieces marvelous acquisitions for your museum. Regret immensely not being in a position to facilitate purchase."

It is not for me to tell you your business, but it seems to me you are taking an untenable position in regard to the Carnegie Institute offers on the Weber and Hartley.

To say that you are not acquainted with the Hartley heirs and therefore cannot do anything sounds just a little foolish to me. You have to deal with them in the long run. Why not do it now? It seems to me you have a responsibility to the Hartley Estate to sound out the situation. The estate may need ready cash, and while we do not want to take advantage of that possible emergency, we have made a fair offer on this painting and should have the opportunity to have a reply from those who are most concerned.

You know well that any museum in the United States would expect and is granted a discount of at least thirty-three per cent on the list price of a painting for a permanent collection. We have tried to do our best for Max Weber, and we expect and should have your cooperation in acquiring "these two pieces marvelous acquisitions for You are in position to facilitate the purchase, and your museum." we do not want to, nor will we go over your head to the Marsden Hartley heirs or Max Weber. Let us have a little cooperation from you, and if you are interested in what American museums are doing it will be a simple matter for you to see that Max Weber and Marsden Hartley are in the permanent collection of Carnegie Institute, and it will all resound to the honor and glory of the house of Rosenberg.

Dear Mr. O'Connor,

Since my letter of yesterday I had the visit of Max Weber. As you undoubtedly know, it is very difficult to deal with artists and in this particular instance Max refuses to relent because he feels - and perhaps with just reason - that his painting is well worth the price he demands and so there is very little I can do about it. However, I am more than anxious to see him represented in your institute and I take upon myself to propose you the following: in order to facilitate the purchase I am ready, for my part, to relinquish \$200.00 on the commission that would come to me as a result of the sale. On the other hand if you think it possible to offer \$1600.00, in that manner everything could be arranged for the satisfaction of the artist and you would be able to include in your permanent collection one of the finest examples of Max Weber's work.

As for Hartley I can only repeat what I have said before. Since his death, private collectors and museums have been acquiring his pictures in great number and all the purchases have been made at the prices set by Hartley without discussion. You know that I would bnly be too glad to help you if it were at all possible but I would have to face the consequences of explaining to the heirs why I had desisted in this instance when at all other times no such question had arisen. I am sure you understand my delicate position in this matter and that you realize there is nothing I can personally do to make the purchase easier for you.

I wish to confirm my telegram of today in answer to your second offer concerning the pictures of Marsden Hartley and Max Weber.

As I said before, I cannot do anything about Marsden Hartley for the following reasons:— first of all there are nine beirs for the estate. Marsden Hartley having died in Maine we have to await the opening of the court in that state for the nomination of an executor. To my knowledge, this has not yet been done. Furthermore, I had a contract with the artist which is still in full force and there is no possibility for me to reduce the prices set by the artist. If I were to do so I would most probably find myself faced with great difficulties towards the heirs and, as you will realize I am sure, there is nothing I can possibly do in this matter.

As regards "The Quartet", this picture has been in great
demand and at the price you quote it would already have been sold over
and over again. It is a very striking example of Max Weber's work
and has aroused great interest. I feel, therefore, that it would be
useless for me to approach the artist since I know quite well that he
would never consider your offer having already refused higher bids for
this picture.

I most sincerely regret not being able to help you because these two paintings really belong in an institution such as yours. They are perfect examples of these two great American painters and I can assure you that I would be more than pleased to see them represented in your museum. However, I do hope you will understand it does not rest with me to take a decision.
