I enclose a list of the Goodwins, grouped as to size, with the prices net to me, which I should expect to get.

My prices may seem high but I think them reasonable for several reasons.

I have always been willing to pay a good price for a fine example of Goodwin's work (which is why I have the collection I do) and I have owned many of them for a long time. So I have had a considerable amount of money invested in the pictures for some time and feel that # should get a fair return on it.

Also I know the prices that the pictures used to bring in Goodwin's lifetime and though there was a great drop in values afterwards, the prices have been rising steadily in the last five years and that without any advertisement or promotion. Moreover, apart from the Elwell group, for which I did not bid, as I understood that you were interested in purchasing them, very few Goodwins have come on the market in the last few years.

As I have studied Goodwin's work over the years and become more acquainted with his versatility, I am convinced that he will inevitably take his place, sooner or later, along with Homer and the other really great American painters. He only needs someone like yourself to bring him again before the public and you are the person best fitted to do so.

I have recently received a catalogue from John Nicholson of some Childe Hassams he has for sale and the prices run from \$750-1200 for pastels and from \$1400 (22x15) -\$3500 for oils. These prices are interesting comparatively and also as indicating the current trend and the growing interest in the American impressionists.

As I explained in my letter to Professor Venturi, we do not wish to part with all our Goodwins, so I am keeping a few of which we are particularly fond, As you will see, however, the list I am sending includes most of the finest in each group and the bulk of the large ones.

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The prices I have given are consignment prices. Now I am willing to sell any of the pictures, if we can agree on a price and obviously I would not expect you to pay the same prices, if you were buying the pictures now. I definitely wish that you should buy some ofthe pictures, if I am to consign the others to you. I think that it is only fair that you should. The question of price for those you buy is a matter we cam discuss when I am next in New York and I am sure that we can arrive at a figure that will be satisfactory to both of us. I have to come down sometime this month and I will come in to see you then.

Dear Mr Venturi

I am not willing to accept Mr Rosenberg's conditions. In the first place I do not intend to dispose of all of my Goodwins. Some of them belong to my wife and others we have had hanging for several years and we do not wish to strip the house of them all. Secondly I do not consider his prices equitable.

I am, however, willing to let him have the bulk of the pictures, if he is willing to buy some of them now at fair prices and to take the remainder on consignment at my valuations. Naturally I would not expect him to pay the same price for those he buys now as for those he takes on consignment. If he is willing to agree in principle to this arrangement, I will make a list of the pictures I wish to sell and of those I wish to consign, with individual prices, as I do not think that the pictures should be priced by size but by quality.

I think that Mr Rosenberg is undoubtedly the best dealer to handle Goodwin, but if he does not put on an exhibition, I think that you and I have enough influence to get an exhibition put on at the Metropolitan or the Boston Museum to start the bell rolling. I have complete faith in Goodwin's work and feel that his recognition as the greatest impressionist and one of the greatest painters this country has produced is bound to come fairly soon anyhow. The whole trend in the last two years of Art criticism and of Museum and dealer exhibitions of American painting indicates that clearly.

Now I am very willing to cooperate fully with Mr Rosenberg but the cooperation should be mutual. I have already demonstrated my cooperation by refraining from buying the Elwell collection, as you requested, when we discussed the whole Goodwin matter in your apartment two years ago. I have had nothing to do with Mr Castano's purchase of these pictures.

If Mr Rosenberg accepts my suggestion, I will make and send you a list, though I am afraid that I cannot do so until later in the Summer. My niece, who is practically our

So there are definite advantages in making the change, but meantime there are the accumulations of nearly ten years to sort and pack and the prospect appalls me.

Anyway let me know if Mr Rosenberg is a agreeable to my suggestion and I will do my best to let you have the list as soon as possible.

I do not think that Mr Castano is wise in accepting Mr Rosenberg's conditions, but that of course is a matter for him.
