Following our telephone conversation of Saturday, I inquired what would be the approximate shipping cost of the equipment for the exhibition of color transparencies to your museum.

This equipment includes twenty wooden boxes, measuring each 50 x 20 x 10 inches, and each box requires two glass panes, bringing the total weight to one thousand pounds.

The packing of this material for shipment by railway is difficult and would necessarily have to be elaborate. This would cost about two hundred dollars both ways, not including the railway fare, which would also amount to a substantial sum.

It seems to me that the only practical way of shipping this equipment is by van. No packing would be necessary, and the transportation charges would be reduced to a minimum.

As to the period of exhibition, we tentatively figured it out for November 20 to December 10.

In undertaking this program, the initial part of which we are now ready to release, we have been constantly guided by the desire to provide an equipment as rich in educational value as can be obtained from the available resources of today.

The considerable expansion of artistic culture and the widening of the general taste have made imperative the obligation to diffuse among students, artists, and the public at large, an increasing number of the fundamental treasures of universal art. Original objects being not easily obtainable, and travelling facilities limited, the only practical way to do so is to have at command a well composed library of modern color slides.

That education has to rely increasingly on the use of such slides is far from being an unfortunate servitude. For the progress of color photography, approximating perfection, makes them, on the contrary, a completely reliable aid for artistic education. Thanks to this medium, it is possible to fully study and appreciate, at one's leisure or for classroom work, objects of art that would, otherwise, remain too little known. In fact, provided that the slides be of high quality, they offer opportunities of study that the originals often deny. Not only do they provide the possibility of an attentive and logical inspection of the subject under the best conditions of exposure and light, but they also furnish, for detailed examination, the powerful resources of advanced photographic analysis. Especially, large scale details, over-emphasizing the artist's technique, are startlingly enlightening.

With these considerations in mind, we have tried, and will continue, to produce series of slides covering the most outstanding and indispensable treasures of art. We propose to concentrate on those that are uneasy to reach, or those which, for some reason, have been little, if at all, publicized.
