Mr. Paul Rosenberg:

You will recall that years back, when Mrs. Selznick and I made our first purchase from you, I told you that I was not going to quarrel or quibble with you about prices, that I wanted to trust you implicitly, and that you could look forward to a long association in various purchases by me so long as I never had any reason to doubt your complete protection of me on prices. Subsequently, I repeated this statement to you on other occasions. I also told you that rather than let my suspicions fester into distrust, I would immediately apprize you any time that I felt that the prices had not been right.

It is in this spirit that I feel obliged, in justice to myself and to you, to inform you that I had something of a shock growing out of my attempts to sell the Matisse which I purchased from you a year or so ago. When I decided to dispose of it, I first took it up with your firm. You were in Europe at the time, and I could get no definitive reply, other than that the picture would have to be shown in the East to be sold there. Naturally, without more encouragement, I was reluctant to send it East, lest it merely sit in your galleries for an indefinite length of time, depriving me of the pleasure of having it without any assurance of its being sold.

Accordingly, I took up with local dealers the matter of its sale. They have advised me that the price that I paid for it is way, way out of line, and that under no circumstances can I hope to get for it anything like the price that I paid. Since I have no information that the values on Matisse's work have depreciated in the interim, and since in any case these dealers advise me that the price was extraordinarily high at any time, I am sure you can understand my concern.

We acknowledge receipt, with thanks, of your letter of April 8th and appreciate your explanation in regard to the purchase of objects of art in Germany.

As many of my pictures had been stolen in France by the Germans, and a large part of my collection has not, as yet, been located, I am, therefore, aware that in a number of cases the rightful ownership of various objects of art has not, to date, been established.

I made reference to paintings that have been in German collections prior to the first world war and the last war. In fact, I personally sold many pictures to Germans as far back as 40 years ago, and I know that in many incidences some collections have remained intact and are in the possession of the original owners. It is these well known collections that I refer to, and many of their pictures have been reproduced in art books and various periodicals and, consequently, the ownership can readily be traced. It has been brought to my attention that several dealers in foreign countries are trying to negotiate for the acquisition of many important pictures in Germany. Therefore, for our cultural interest, I firmly believe that these great pictures should rightfully be brought to this country to eliminate their distribution in Europe.

Our museums and educational institutions would be greatly enriched and benefitted if, through my efforts, I would be given the permission to purchase pictures from recognized German collections.

For the protection of the American public and myself, I will only negotiate for pictures that are, and can proven to be, authentic and from rightful and original sources.

My reputation and knowledge is known to every museum director in this country. For example, I can refer you to Mr. John Walker of the National Gallery in Washington.

I plan to leave for France in June and I would greatly appreciate hearing from you as soon as possible if arrangements can be made for me to buy pictures from reputable collections from Germany and bring them to America.

You may recall that this past summer, through your kind efforts, your office confirmed that our photostat copies were the exact duplicates of the original Consolidated Interrogation Reports, 1 and, 2, in the files of the Office of Strategic Service. These reports were used as additional evidence for my pending law suit in Switzerland.

As I previously informed you, I left France in 1940, and because of the war I necessarily discontinued my art business in Paris, 21 rue de Boetie, which I had established about forty years ago. My possessions such as: paintings, objects d'art, furniture, etc., remained in France a part of which was stored, under my name, in Floirac and Libourne. The Germans confiscated my paintings and many of them were transported to Switzerland and sold to Mr. Fischer of Lausanne who knew that these pictres were my property as on the back of each canvas my name was indicated.

Mr. Fischer new claims that he is the rightful owner of my pictures despite the fact that he purchased stolen properties. As a result of his illegal transactions and in order to retrieve my pictures I have been compelled to instigate a law suit against him.

I know that Mr. Fischer has been interviewed by one of your representatives at the legation in Berne. Mr. Fischer's testimony to your representative was false as he stated that he purchased only three to your representative was false as he stated that he purchased only three French paintings from Mr. Hofer whereas, in the Interrogation Report it is proven that he bought about sixty pictures.

It would be most beneficial to me if your offices would authorize the American Legation in Berne to communicate to the Federal Court of Lausanne a copy of Mr. Fischer's Interrogation Report and his replies. Your kind attention in this matter would be most appreciated as not only Wour kind attention in this matter would be most appreciated as not only would my case be benefited but also those other collectors whose pictures were stolen and are now trying to recover them.

My case is scheduled for the 27th of January in the Federal Court of Lausanne and, therefore I would be very grateful if arrangements can be made to communicate a copy of the report before that date.
