I have been worried by a number of important buyers and some of the figures they have offered to pay in cash are astoundingly big. Personally, I would rather deal with you, but I want to be sure of certain things. For example, you gave me certain estimates as to what you feel sure you can get for certain pictures, and you said in some cases you would probably get more than you estimated, and you figured on taking 20% of the price as commission. I appreciate, of course, your unique position in America, where you are able to get high prices. Ordinarily, in London the commission is 10% and at auctions 121%. My son is very keen for me to sell all the pictures I want to dispose of by auction, which I do not wish to do.

You can understand that if I sent you an important lot of pictures, and you were not feeling well, or unable to sell them, if they were not sold in New York then I have ruined, or greatly injured, the value of these pictures if I have to take them back to Europe and sell them there.

I have sold a few to friends of mine at probate, but they have consented to include them with my pictures on the same terms.

It seems to me that if I sent you a number of pictures it would not be unreasonable to ask that I should be guaranteed a certain minimum price, and that the pictures would be disposed of, or practically all of them, within a period of, say, nine months.

What I want to be sure of is that if they are shipped to you in New York and you should have to go to Europe, and perhaps your son would not be feeling well, the pictures are not hung up in New York, for if they are returned to me in Europe after they have been offered in New York and not sold, the values would be seriously affected.

There is one interesting thing: A syndicate approached my secretary (I have had no communication with them except to say that I do not wish to sell the collection) and offered to buy the whole collection for cash in dollars. They only wished to buy the collection as a whole, at a price that was apparently 20% less than your total valuation on the whole lot. In fact, they offered \$1,500,000 for the pictures, and I think you put the gross value at \$1,900,000, so 20% on that would be \$380,000, which would come to \$1,520,000. But this also included the pictures of national importance, which I naturally do not want to sell, as I only get 3% of the selling price. I did not want to make them of national importance, but I was in the position that if I paid duty on them it would have raised the gross value of the estate, and I would have had to pay a different rate of death duties on the whole estate, which rather forced me to declare certain things of national importance, on which I would have preferred to pay 6% duty.

Please let me have your views on this matter, as I want to get all these things arranged before I get the discharge, so that I can act quickly after I receive it.

I am so pleased you are coming over to Europe this summer and shall look forward to the pleasure of seeing you. I am glad you are feeling much better and taking business very slowly and giving your son the benefit of your experience, but not tiring yourself too much.

Binding myself to these minimum prices will certainly not mean that I shall be satisfied to obtain them. My aim will be to get as high a price as conditions will permit. For many items of the list I feel confident that I can top my previsions. However, there are occurrences which cannot rationally be foreseen and do not belong to the field of strictly understood business. This is why I cannot give you there a guarantee in figures, but only protest that you may have every reason to expect some very spectacular success.

I remind you in this respect my engagement to have a certified accounting made of each transaction, in which the name of the buyer and the means and date of payment will be disclosed to you, and naturally the amount of the sale which will be entirely accrued to your benefit, under the general terms.

This brings me to the question of the rate of commission that you are charged. I would not like you to think that the figure I advanced is out of proportion with the accepted practice, at least in this country. The larger galleries of New York take pictures on consignment at 22 percent. Parke-Bernet, the leading auction establishment, charges 23 percent. The rate of 10 percent applies more generally to the occasional brokerage of an intermediary than to the sustained effort of an agent who has the responsibility and the expense of defending to the best of his ability a large trust such as yours. As to the idea of an auction sale, I advise you against it very much, because the auctioneer has no possibility of working up the response of the public, nor has he any control on the prices, and because it brings the kind of publicity which you want to avoid, publicity decidedly harmful in the case of the unsuccessful sale of certain items. However, if you find 20 percent to be an excessive rate, I am on this point again ready to discuss with you lowering it to such figure which will convince you of the entire fairness of my position; this is for me the most important consideration of all. as I do not want our friendship to be ever affected by misgivings of any kind. But I feel that hhe engagements I am now taking justify such a rate, in reason of the risk involved.

I believe that you are also entitled to receive a guarantee with respect to the time involved in disposing of the pictures. The fact that I did not raise this question previously reflects my certainty of getting results promptly. I have, however, no hesitation in accepting that a definite limit be set. I want only to point out two considerations : first, that the summer months, with museum curators abread and collectors on vacation, reduce considerably the actual working time, and, secondly, that there is a certain incompatibility between seeking fast sales and obtaining maximum prices, as you will no doubt understand without my developing this point. Therefore, the period of nine months which you suggest seems to me a bit short, and I would feel much better with one year. Also because these additional three months would extend into the

Fall and Winter months, the most rewarding by my experience. I consequently propose that the agreement be established for one year and renewed if needed and mutually agreeable.

To bind together these two questions of prices and time, which are related in several aspects, I would be prepared, in principle, to propose to you the following guarantees : six months after I receive the pictures, I engage myself to have made to you payments amounting to at least half of the value of the let consigned to me, irrespective of the sales actually realized by that time. This means, I will complete whatever difference appears between the proceeds of the sales and the half list value (based on the valuations agreed upon, less an amount corresponding to the commission I make), in the event the former are found lacking in respect to the latter. Then, at the issue of twelve months, I would engage myself to a similar adjustment by which you will receive at least a high proportion of the total list value, let us say 85 percent, less again the commission consented to me. At that time, however, and supposing our agreement terminates, I will retain for myself pictures covering, still at list value less commission, the excess of my payment over the sales actually realized. In other terms, I would substitute myself to the buyers whom I would have failed to find. But I would, naturally, take into account, to determine the discrepency to be filled, any surplus profit made on sales over the list price. This arrangement guarantees you that you cannot fare worse than selling practically everything at valuation price, but that you may get a lot more if, as I anticipate, the sales will have produced an amount larger than the list valuations.

Before I enter into such an agreement, I would like to know what pictures you would send me, as their nature will determine the sale prospect, and their aggregate value will reveal the size of my committment. This is why I asked you to give me the numbers of these paintings as they appear on the inventory.

I also wish to allay your fears that your pictures would be left in New York uncared for during the time that I and my son are in Europe. The above lines can tell you that I will not take this matter lightly, and that one of us will always be here. Besides, we have among our staff other competent people who can assure the continuity of our compaigning. Moreover, at no time will the pictures be hung on display for the general public, but they will only be shown privately to a selected group of buyers. I want to assure you that the whele business will be kept as confidential as possible, with no attempt at publicity, and that no harm will ensue. It is not conceivable that paintings of such quality, even if some of them would have to be returned to you, would suffer a loss of value for remaining unsold for a comparatively short period of time, a fact, moreover, that would escape general knowledge.

Lastly, I want to assure you that there is more than enough energy left in me to permit me to take care of this business with complete devotion and ability, and that any engagement I take in the name of the firm is equally binding on my son, who is as respectful of a pledge as I am myself. In no event will you be made to regret your decision. You know me well enough to be satisfied that I would not assume such a responsibility in an untrustworthy spirit or a disappointing manner, and even more so when it is taken with a person like you whom I respect so completely. In brief, I would like to convey to you my resolution that this agreement will turn to your entire satisfaction and will fully protect your best interest in the matter, as no other and will fully protect your best interest in the matter, as no other scheme would.

Let me know, at your convenience, your reaction to this letter, and the suggestions you may have, so that we can reach soon an understanding agreeable to both of us.

My dear Rosenberg,

Thank you for your telegram of the 27th.

In regard to the pictures, and the sale of the same, my idea, when I sell them, will be to sell them delivered in Dublin, and the buyer will be in a position to examine them and have them packed under his supervision, and then he can take the pictures over and ship them in any way he sees fit.

The reason that I shall have to sell them in this manner, when I decide about selling, is because in all probability I shall receive the discharge at the end of January, in which case I propose to sell the pictures I wish to dispose of probably in February.

Now, I will not be able to get back to Dublin, and my secretary is not experienced in these matters. The position is that the pictures are in the safe deposit vault of the Bank of Ireland. They were packed by Chenne, and Chenne can send over his man to attend to the unpacking and repacking of the pictures, so the buyer, whoever he may be, will know exactly the condition of the pictures and how they are packed. Then the buyer must arrange for the assurance and all these details, as he will be an expert in these matters, and I have never shipped or insured any pictures myself. This arrangement will be very much more satisfactory to everyone concerned.

Upon the delivery of the pictures, there will be a certain amount of money paid down, probably the first payment, if it is a guaranteed purchase, with me sharing in any excess prices after commission is paid. If, on the other hand, the person who is the buyer of the pictures is paying cash for the whole transaction, I have no further interest in the price for which the pictures are sold later.

The list which I am sending includes practically everything there is for sale, or will be for sale, from the Collection. There are in this list some pictures which are held by the Trustee of some friends of mine, who bought them at the probate value, but they are including these in the sale on the same terms that I accept for my pictures, so it does not complicate the matter.

I now enclose xxx a list of the pictures which I am considering selling, with the numbers on the list which you have. I believe you have a copy of the original list of the Collection, which includes the pictures of national importance. I had to declare them of national importance on account of not increasing the rate of death duties on the entire estate.

You will see that a number of pictures are missing, but not very important ones. These have been loaned to the National Gallery of Ireland, and I have left them to the Gallery in my Will. Then there was "The Peasant" by Van Gogh and the two Toulouse Lautrec, a pastel by Degas of two or three women leaning over a rail and a Cezanne water colour, that now belong to my son, but he does not want to sell them under any conditions. This was not one of the Cezanne water colours that you wanted.

To summarize the position: There is the list which I am sending you herewith of the pictures I am considering selling. Secondly, there are the pictures which my son has, which are not for sale, and thirdly, there are the three pictures which I am keeping for myself - Degas' "Repasseurs", the Van Gogh "Tree" and the Cezanne "Tulips".

Then there are the pictures of national importance, which I have no intention of selling, as if they are sold I only receive 3% of the value. Perhaps my children or grandchildren at some future date will sell them, but I do not think so.

Then there are the pictures which I have loaned to the National Gallery of Freland. I have given them one Cezanne water colour and the others are on loan. can send a list of these, if necessary, but they will not come on the market, as I have provided in my Will for them to go to the National Gallery.

Iour decision of selling the pictures delivered in Dublin, and obtaining there a discharge, makes it necessary that the buyer or the person contracting the engagement be myself, because I cannot ask any client to go to Dublin to ascertain his interest in the paintings, and because it is most difficult to sell pictures without actually showing them to the prospective buyer; but assuming personally the engagement that you request is perfectly agreeable to me, whichever way your preference goes: either that I take charge of the eighteen paintings listed, with a down payment of, say, one third, and a guaranteed purchase within a year, with you continuing to share interest above the list price; or that I buy outright the paintings and settle immediately for the totality. In the latter case, however, the amount I'ls naturally an important consideration which I have asked you to clarify.... In other words, what would be the relation of prices to those indicated on the list? In the former case, the rate of commission is the important factor. For the sake of simplicity and speed, I would be inclined to prefer the second solution.

My son is planning a trip to England and France, possibly next week. This would constitute a good opportunity for reaching an agreement through direct conversation with you. However, having seen the pictures just before they were packed by Chenue, with whom I have worked for many years, I am personally satisfied that the condition of the pictures is good, and the packing sound.

I was expecting a letter from you supplementing your telegram to me, and as I did not hear from you I was on the point of writing to you when I received your telegram of the 14th January, which shows you were evidently expecting a letter from me, just as I was expecting one from you.



Referring to the letter from Paul Rosenberg & Co. making an offer for certain pictures, some of which are owned by me and some by Mr. Dermot McGilly-cuddy and Mr. Johnstone as Trustees, I beg to state that we accept the same.

As I told you after consultation with the Trustees who own some of the pictures, I was prepared to accept your offer of February 1st as soon as I received the discharge from the Irish Government. The discharge was delivered to Mr. McGillycuddy this morning and I have cabled you as follows:-

"Referring to your letter of February first signed by Alexander Rosenberg on behalf of Paul Rosenberg & Co stop Have discussed matter with Dermot McGillycuddy who as trustee owns some of the pictures mentioned in my letter to you of January seventeenth 1955 stop He approves and we hereby accept the offer contained in your letter of February first 1955 to me stop Am writing fully Kind Regards. Chester Beatty."

Mr. McGillycuddy accepts on behalf of the pictures he and his co-trustees control and I accept on behalf of the pictures I own. All of the pictures are mentioned in my letter to you of the 17th January.

I suggest, in view of the fact that there are other people interested, that it might be better for Mr. McGillycuddy to draw up a formal agreement covering the three lots of pictures, which combined make up the pictures covered by my letter of the 17th January and by your letter of the 1st February which includes two

Please let me know about this, and then we will deliver the pictures to whoever you designate, or if you would prefer it, I imagine we could arrange for you to pay the Bank of Ireland in my name and Mr. McGillycuddy's name, and then we would deliver the pictures to the Bank of Ireland and they would deliver them to your Shipping Agents.

The only advantage in turning them over to your representative instead of the Bank of Ireland is that there is always a good deal of red tape, and the Bank of Ireland will not want to take the responsibility of passing the pictures through their hands, and also they may insist upon opening all the boxes, whereas we have the very important pictures packed by Chenue in the original Chenue packing, and if they require to be opened then I would much prefer Chenue's representative to go from London at my expense to see that they are properly opened and properly closed. They are such wonderful packers and the pictures are so valuable that I do not like to have strange packers handle the important ones. There is no great objection to using Anderson, Stanford & Ridway for some of the minor pictures, as there are only a few boxes involved, and we have the original boxes and place for the transfer, but have the original boxes and place for the transfer, but I do not like the pictures like "The Boy" and "The Brioche" to be opened by anyone but Chenue.

I want to carry this through in the manner you wish, and I assume that you will arrange with Arbuckle, Smith and Company, or your New York agents, all the details in regard to the insurance.

I am sending you a list of the boxes which are in the safe deposit vaults at the Bank of Ireland, and these boxes were all packed by Chenue. You will see that practically all the pictures are in single boxes, so none very few of these need be disturbed, which is very satisfactory, as we are sure that they are well packed.

Please give my kindest regards to your father and tell him I am so pleased he is feeling so much better and I am looking forward with great pleasure to seeing him this summer.



However, our insurance policy covering this shipment is such that it includes a complete release of the carrier and the waving of any recourse against the airline. Thank you for your telegram. I think everything is now in order.

I was hoping to be able to get the pictures off in about a week, but a new delay has occurred. I wanted to make certain that they were well packed, and Mr. Wooderson took the matter up with Chenue. Chenue said it would not be safe to ship them without opening the boxes and making sure that they were firmly packed, because over the period of time they have been in these boxes there may be a certain amount of shrinkage. both in the wood and in the packing, and we cannot take the risk of any play within the boxes as the pictures might be damaged. We are now making every effort to get Chenue to Dublin as quickly as possible, but unfortunately the National Gallery is using him, so it may be ten days or so before he can go there.

I think you will agree with me that it would be unsafe to send these very valuable pictures unless we are certain there is no movement within the boxes. Of course, all the expenses for the re-packing will be for my account, but I want to make sure they leave Dublin in perfect condition. I think you will agree that this is the proper procedure, unless your father is very anxious to get the pictures immediately. I did not answer your telegram, as you stated you were writing, and I awaited the arrival of your letter, which I beg to acknowledge. The matter is all in order now.

I am arranging with London to send Chenue's representative to pack the picture, as I do not want to trust it to any other packer, and am instructing Messrs. Arbuckle, Smith and Company to see the picture before it is closed up to see that it is in perfect condition.

We have already applied for the export licence, and as soon as we get it and the picture is packed we will turn it over to Arbuckle, Smith and Co., and they will get in touch with you and arrange about the insurance.
