Many thanks for your letter. I have of course known for two weeks at least that you were arriving Monday 26th -- so here's first of all a great big WELCOME ; !: I'm just too sorry that I am not and cannot be in Paris at the same time -- but why leave it so late before writing to me ? This is Whitsun -- and of course I have the whole Picasso gang in the house and around for two da ys. I left Paris 2nd May, and I have NO reason for going back there, least of all at this critical moment. I am HERE, and as I have bits of work to do am staying. I have refused to go to Venice. The Sutherlands invited me, and I chose the IOth June, but when I found that this date coincided with the opening of the Biennale I cancelled because I cent face that horde of uncultivated international buresucrats and yapping, greedy artists, and a crowd of people whom I avoid all the year through. I shall be here. YOU on the other hand will be steing the Marxes, Peggy Guggenheim, Alfred Frankfurter, Renrose, Maeght, the Blocks perhaps, the Sutherlands -- oh!oh; UGH; !; Might just as well be in Broadway or Piccadilly.

Nobody told me about your mother's death. I'm very sorry to hear of it, because for all her faults, you were devoted to her, as she was devoted to you, and she was your only anchorage in life. Oh I do wish I had been with you all this while. You know that you are never out of my mind. I know what you have felt and been through. You are more than right to take time off in Europe.

Now, first thing, I MUST speak to you, we MUST meet. Please call me here -- number above -- on Tuesday morning around 9. Monday is no good because it is a holiday, my telephone closes at II in the morning and then I am off to a bullfight for the rest of the day. I presume you intend to spend a week in Venice, since the Biennale doesn't open till the I4th. So I suppose the only solution is to suggest that you come



I have still not quite been able to cope with all Mother's papers. I have already turned over to Mr. Shaw her lease.

At one time, certainly as recently as four or five years ago, Mother owned a fair amount of stocks and bonds. Some of these may have been listed in her separation agreement with my father. I have not been able to find any trace of these and would assume they have all been spent.

I have found no trace of any life insurance policy, just what I suppose is the usual fire, theft and loss insurance. There are several such policies. I have found no trace of any savings account although I know until recently Mother had one.

Her checking account was with the Chase Manhattan Bank, 510 Park Avenue, New York 22. Mother at various times was in correspondence with a Mr. Bogert at the Chase.

She also had accounts at three banks on the West Coast. I knew nothing about these. The first was a joint account with a Mr. Jorgen Jenson with the Wells Fargo Bank in Belmont, California. His address as well as hers is Box 51, Stanford University. As far as I can make out \$29 and some odd cents remained in this account which she closed out shortly before her death. The remained in this account which she closed out shortly before her death. The second bank is the Crocker-Anglo National Bank, P.O. Box 150 Main, Palo Alto, California. I think about \$150 remains in this. The third is the Bank of America, French-American branch, 108 Sutter Street, San Francisco 4. I think about \$16 remains.

Mother's other tangible assets as far as I can make out are jewelry, furniture and prints. I am preparing an itemized list of the jewelry. One thing I still have not been able to find is a double strand of baroque pearls for which I paid about \$300. For the furniture I enclose paid bill for most of the items in the apartment. Additional furniture not listed consists of a television machine, one wood and leather chair, I wood and wicker chair, one round coffee table and one square table. Mother was a member of the Teachers Retirement System of the City of New York, 154 Nassau Street, New York 38. Her "registry number" was 31622. She has borrowed against whatever monies were or are there. I think the person to be notified is Miss May Andres Healy.

She has also borrowed money from the National City Bank of New York, 57th Street and First Avenue, New York.

I don't know whether this is important or not, but according to Mother's birth certificate her name was not Bertha, but Louise. Her Social Security number was 085-30-6389.

Mother paid out or gave what for a woman in her circumstances was a considerable amount of money. I have met only one of these people, a Mr. Frank Terry. The only contractual obligation I can find is a promisory note dated in September of last year from a Milton R. Calvin. It is for 3556. On December 4, 1957, I have a note dated from the Bank of America, 108 Sutter Street, San Francisco, thanking her for forwarding a signed signature card for a new checking account for Mr. Calvin described as her nephew. Mother also apparently bought him a Vespa on which \$56.77 (the cost of freight and shipping) remains to be paid. I have no address for Mr. Calvin. The business about the other car, the Ford, I knew nothing about until I saw you last week. I assume this has been settled. The Volkswagen which I knew she had purchased two or three years ago must have been given by her to Mr. Terry.

Mother was not particularly tidy about her papers, however, I have made as much sense as possible about the various outstanding bills. These I have alphabetized and will turn over to you tomorrow. I think they amount to slightly less than \$3000.

Mother's rent is not paid through March but I am perfectly willing to continue the rent for another month.

My aunt, Mrs. Elise Trumbull, is well-to-do. My uncle, Mr. Arthur Slattery, however has been heckling me. He seems to think that Mother left a gold mine for himself and his family. He has asked me twice "what gives" and I have told him that as far as I know nothing. He has also spoken of personal effects of his wife Ruth which he says are in Mother's possession. Also a deed for a plot at a cemetery. As far as I know, and I am quite certain of this, there is nothing in the apartment belonging to my uncle or his wife. Mother and my Father had been the sole support of my grandfather for many years before his death. When he died, some monies did turn up which were turned over to my Mother and Father. For many years my Mother saw neither her brother nor her sister. They resumed seeing each other about four years ago. The deed for the cemetery plot is quite clearly marked in my aunt's name (Mrs. Trumbull).

I have tried to be as pleasant as possible under the circumstances with my undle, Mr. Slattery. Over the phone yesterday, however, he so violently upset me that I asked him not to phone me again and to get in touch with you.
