MUSEUM ANNOUNCES CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM FOR

INFANTILE PARALYSIS POSTERS

\$2.500 IN AWARDS TO BE GIVEN

The Museum of Modern Art announces an exhibition of original posters produced in co-operation with the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to be held at the Museum, 11 West 53 Street, from November 1 through November 20. This is the first time an art museum has co-operated with a national health group to produce educational posters of high artistic value.

Executed by 24 invited artists and photographers who were chosen by a Committee of Selection, the original posters will go on view in the Museum's first floor galleries on November 1. On the previous day announcement will be made of the jury-selected winners of three awards: \$1,000, \$750 and \$500, made available by an anonymous donor. An additional award of \$250 will be given at the close of the exhibition on the basis of a popular ballot. Certain posters will be selected by the National Foundation for reproduction and distribution on a national scale; it is expected that other designs also will be used to illustrate educational material on polio. The exhibition is of particular interest due to the epidemic emergency of the present period and the National Foundation's need for additional support to continue its program of patient care, scientific research and professional education.

In announcing the exhibition, Monroe Wheeler, the Museum's Director of Exhibitions and Publications, said:

"Who can tell the many-faceted story of the National Foundation and its fight against polio? How can the human, scientific and educational factors be translated into terms that will appeal to a vast public? Who can relate the efforts of the many skilled hands that are serving this great cause? And the polio patients themselves; how can their valiant fight to return to normal lives be told?

"The Museum of Modern Art believes that only the creative artist, applying his probing insight, his deep understanding and vivid imagination, can tell the whole story in visual terms."
